The Diocese of York's Retreat House, Wydale Hall, has published its 2024 programme, shaped around the diocesan Rhythm of Life. Wydale Hall has been the diocesan retreat house since the early 1960s, and is considered a homefrom-home to hundreds of people who come to Wydale to train, learn, relax, retreat, laugh, cry and hear God. Wydale hosts about 10,000 people a year for residentials and day events, and is a core of our diocese as a prayerful community renewing the church's mission.

Each year, Wydale offers a rich programme, and the newly published programme for 2024 reflects the diocesan Rhythm of Life. Underpinned by the diocesan vision of Living Christ's Story, the programme follows this pattern of holy living through events are designed to help with understanding the bible better, with worship, with prayer and with learning how to be a better disciple of Jesus Christ. Most events are day-long teaching, retreat and quiet days, whilst some events are residential.

Wydale's General Manager Mark Rance says, "Wydale is often described as a 'thin' place. We think what this means is that at Wydale people find a place where they feel closer to God, and where the separation between God and us

seems less - perhaps some of this is to do with the fact that on coming to Wydale people are committing to moving out of their normal lives for a few hours, committing to spending time seeking God, to growing with him.

"Wydale has been a holy place for most of its 240+ years makes it important to people - there has been prayer and worship here for many years and we hope it shows.

"We at Wydale are excited by the variety of events we're able to offer in 2024, and we're excited that there are practical ways in which people can explore what it means to be community - in the wider sense and closer to home with the Wydale community.

"We're also excited that this year's beautifully presented programme of events also includes some interesting articles on the history of Wydale, its community, how Wydale is part of the Diocesan vision, and even something from a Bishop about the practice of retreating!"

The Porvoo Declaration commits the churches which have signed it 'to share a common life' and 'to pray for and with one another'. An important way of doing this is to pray through the year for the Porvoo churches and their Dioceses.

One of the many joys of the Advent, Christmas and Epiphany season is the intergenerational and economically diverse and multicultural groups of people that enrich the stories that are told.

From the youngest to the oldest, from the homeless to the those of respectability and affluence, all are there, faithfully seeking, and following God. The stories are full of drama with angels and stars, camels, and sheep, yet at the heart of every story is the willingness to say 'Yes' to the invitation.

Each story of faith reminds us, that in God's eyes we are all called, regardless of our age, gender or anything else that in todays society has the potential to limit us. God's call has no limits. This Epiphany eight deacons will be priested. Between them they have an average age of 70, the eldest is 78, they are living proof, that when we have the courage to say 'Yes' to God's invitation there are no limits to what God can do through us.

As we pray for them, we also pray that this New Year each one of us will also say 'Yes' to God's invitation to make ourselves available to his plans.

'Priests are ordained to lead God's people in the offering of praise and the proclamation of the gospel. They share with the Bishop in the oversight of the Church, delighting in its beauty and rejoicing in its well-being. They are to set the example of the Good Shepherd always before them as the pattern of their calling. With the Bishop and their fellow presbyters, they are to sustain the community of the faithful by the ministry of word and sacrament, that we all may grow into the fullness of Christ6 and be a living sacrifice acceptable to God.'

The Archbishop of York, Stephen Cottrell, reflects on the Easter Story.

The Easter Story invites us to rest in the compassion of Jesus, something that we are badly in need of in our world at the moment. The risen Christ is not one who is far-removed from the human experience; instead, he continues to walk alongside those he loves.

Mary Magdalene was the first. Early in the morning, while it was still dark, she discovered the empty tomb. In her distress and confusion, she ran to her friends to tell them. Eventually she ends up in the garden alone. Jesus comes alongside her. He speaks to her: 'Woman, why are you weeping?' But she only recognises him when he says her name.

Perhaps it is the same with us? We only know Jesus, when we know that he knows us, when we find him alongside us, gently, compassionately calling our name.

Easter is a renewed invitation to come into Christ's presence, to surrender yourself to him,

and then to go and tell others what it is that you find. Mary and the disciples did not keep the good news to themselves. They went courageously and boldly to continue telling the story that Jesus had started to tell. And, just as Jesus commissioned the disciples, so too are we commissioned through our baptism.

We are invited to participate in God's mission and ministry, sharing the good news, offering gracious and generous hospitality, seeking to make known God's peace and love known in this world, living Christ's story.

Lord of all life and power, who through the mighty resurrection of your Son overcame the old order of sin and death to make all things new in him: grant that we, being dead to sin and alive to you in Jesus Christ, may reign with him in glory; to whom with you and the Holy Spirit be praise and honour, glory and might, now and in all eternity.

Back-to-School in South Africa

The Back-to-School Service in January at St Peter's, Kleinvlei in False Bay Diocese after the long Summer and Christmas Vacation is a meaningful opportunity for the local Church to minister and engage with children, young people and families. Clergy, Choir, Governors and the Congregation come to Church in school uniform; it's a riot of colours, stripes, bursting seams and knee-high socks and school ties.

Some will proudly wear the uniform of their new school for the first time; those who left school many decades ago will have scoured cupboards and charity shops to find knee-high socks and blazers. Many church members will have been working with the students in education, health care and social services and they too will be prayed for. Here is a real sense of ubuntu - community - truly lived out to support, guard and guide this up-and-coming generation.

The Revd Nitano says, "As a Parish we believe education is the most empowering force in the world and we are serious in supporting our young people overcome their difficult circumstances to reach their full potential". The Church Family provides each Learner with a bag of essentials – paper, pens, data and hygiene products. Many have little themselves but give generously what they can. Above all they give the young people value, encouraging them to seize every opportunity, to have dreams, to know the power of possibility.

The service is bursting with laughter; the Rector is transformed into a teenager, 'aunties' and 'uncles' share their stories, recalling happy times, tight scrapes and teachers. They poignantly recall the difficulties and challenges of the apartheid era, and there's sadness that contemporary South Africa faces high levels of youth unemployment, gender violence and the daily disruption of loadshedding.

The Church Building offers safe space for learners to study and do their homework, Holiday Clubs, and snacks provided by parishioners. As the Academic Year draws to a close the Diocese provides practical and spiritual resources for Grade 12 students taking the 'Matric' exams that are their gateway to tertiary education.

God of compassion and wisdom, you see your children growing up in an uncertain and confusing world; show them the path of life. Help us to protect the wellbeing of every child born into our world so that each may live to realise their destiny. We thank you for the wonder of our minds and bodies. Be with our children and young people as they begin a new school year. Bless their teachers and staff and give them strength and grace as their bodies grow in wisdom and knowledge, and as they seek understanding, peace and zeal in their hearts. Amen.

The Competition is run by the Council for the Protection of Rural England and looks to how Churchyards are being cared for and managed, as well as all the community involvement.

Holocaust Memorial Day (HMD) takes place on 27th January each year and commemorates the millions of people murdered during the Holocaust, under Nazi Persecution and in the genocides which followed in Cambodia, Rwanda. Bosnia and Darfur.

On HMD we remember past lessons and recognise that genocide is a steady process which can begin if discrimination, racism and hatred are not checked and prevented. In the UK we are not at immediate risk of genocide, but discrimination has not ended, nor has the use of the language of hatred or exclusion.

There is much to do to create a safer future and HMD is an opportunity to start this process.

'Fragility of Freedom' is the theme for 2024's Holocaust Memorial Day; in every genocide, those who are targeted have had their freedom restricted and removed, before many of them are murdered.

Canon Missioner at York Minster, Maggie McLean, writes: "York Minster's act of commemoration, including the lighting of 600 candles in the Chapter House is part of a weeklong programme of events that takes place across the City of York to mark international Holocaust Memorial Day.

"For ten years the Minster has provided a space for people of all faiths and none to come together to remember the Nazi Persecution and the genocides in Cambodia, Rwanda, Bosnia and Darfur, in the hope that there may be a day in the future with no genocide.

"We learn more about the past, we empathise with others today, and we take action for a better future."

Loving God, we come to you with heavy hearts, remembering the six million Jewish souls murdered during the Holocaust.

In the horrors of that history, when so many groups were targeted because of their identity, and in genocides which followed, we recognise destructive prejudices that drive people apart.

Forgive us when we give space to fear, negativity and hatred of others, simply because they are different from us.

In the light of God, we see everyone as equally precious manifestations of the Divine, and can know the courage to face the darkness.

Through our prayers and actions, help us to stand together with those who are suffering, so that light may banish all darkness, love will prevail over hate and good will triumph over evil. Amen.

The Revd Adam Gaunt shares the story of the development of the choir in Loftus Parish Church.

In 2011 Loftus Parish made the decision to reestablish a Sunday School! Inevitably, it was easily said, but not so easily done; however, in February 2015 our Sunday School began with two children, soon attracting a number of others and not only from families with an established connection with their parish church.

At a similar time we were thinking about the music we offered in Loftus for weekly worship. In 2016 the PCC appointed a new Director of Music. Consequently, on Sunday 18th September 2016 a new church choir sang in Saint Leonard's Church Loftus-in-Cleveland for the first time since the old choir disbanded in 1969!

Although the pandemic years have inevitable had an impact on parish life, in 2023 we now have fourteen signed-up members of our church choir, and with Sunday School and Servers we regularly see over fifteen children in church on a Sunday.

The Revd Graham Potter, Rector of Eston with Normanby, shares his reflections on exploring God's vision and calling within the parish.

I moved into the parish in September 2021 just as we were starting to emerge from the covid restrictions. Most of the usual ministries the parish was involved in had not resumed. And the numbers of available people to run them had decreased. So when asked if certain events could resume my go to questions were: 'who is it for' and why do we do it?

Like most churches post-covid, we didn't have the people to pick up where left off. So these questions were important to make sure we were being effective rather than just busy. When asked if we could restart the weekly coffee morning at Christchurch, I posed those two questions. The answers were telling. About 12 regulars and they are all friends. My reply was to suggest that they went to Costa because the coffee was nicer, and you can get cake! This was met with surprised looks. I went on to suggest that if they wished to provide a safe space where the local community could gather and re-learn how to be together in groups again then I would be happy to discuss how we could achieve this. Fortunately, Costa lost out and we embraced the idea of the coffee morning becoming a space for the local community to gather. The '12' is now regularly 50 to 60 and has been 70.

We meet in the church which now has become a familiar space for newcomers.

While reflecting on how well the coffee morning was running, I realised that many of us had forgotten what it meant to be a follower of Jesus and that a focused sermon series on following Jesus would be a Good thing to do. I discussed this with my preaching team and readers, who agreed to join in, and we followed the Jesus Shaped People series, which is described as a 'whole church discipleship adventure'. Over the 15 weeks of the course, you look at five priorities of Jesus. How he engaged with people, how he taught them, how he built teams, how he prayed and how he prophetically challenged the society around him. All the course linked materials are free and cover sermon outlines, children and youth materials, and small group study guides. My preaching team, who hadn't been asked to preach a series before, stepped up to the challenge.

The outcome of following Jesus Shaped People which refocused our minds on what it means to be a follower of Jesus, was five church members completing the Stepping Up course, a new vision of how our church buildings can be used for the benefit of the community (which included a large £150k repair and upgrade project), a generous and successful gift day for fund the repairs, and a renewed sense of mission in the parish.

Discipleship in Bridlington Deanery

The Revd Mark Carey reflects on shaping the Community of Practice in Bridlington Deanery.

When it comes to creating a Bridlington Deanery plan there has been a desire to do some new things to encourage growth in confidence in being missionary disciples. It was clear that with 21 churches, 17 parishes, serving 41,964 people there is a lot of learning to do especially with significant diversity of spirituality and forms of worshipping communities.

With these thoughts in mind, we chose to hold a Deanery Community of Practice twice a year, 9am-2pm on a Saturday. With a simple, facilitated process enabling us to share our experience of growing in discipleship and mission, our successes and failures, weaknesses and opportunities, we have found a very encouraging way forward.

During September we held our second Community of Practice – 35 people, 5 different teams – great input from The Revd Matt Woodcock (pictured above), and the encouragement to identify the small steps we can take towards growing in more confident in discipleship in our churches, parishes, homes and workplaces.

It is good to be involved in something that is simple and straightforward, that doesn't add to the complexities of ministry but rather draws us back to the heart of it all and renews our vision for becoming more like Christ.

Deanery Gatherings in Southern Ryedale

Sue Teal and The Revd Nicky Penn-Allison share about recent Deanery Gatherings in Southern Ryedale.

Southern Ryedale Deanery is part of the York Archdeaconry family in a beautiful area of North Yorkshire. The Deanery looks a bit like a butterfly as we have two wings made up of three rural benefices to the east and west of a central body which comprises two parishes in the market towns of Malton and Norton.

Although formal Gatherings are paused we are running a Deanery Advent course focused on prayer which is in effect a Gathering in another form! We're looking forward to discerning what God next has in store for us across our deanery.

Andrew Smith, Diocesan Director of Education shares a reflection on the schools in our diocese.

There are 122 Church of England Schools in the Diocese of York.

Each one of these schools has a Statutory Inspection of Anglican and Methodist Schools (SIAMS) inspection once in a five-year period.

SIAMS inspection explores the ways in which each school's theologically rooted Christian vision drives its work and enables the school to live up to its foundation as a Church school. It does so by seeking to answer several key questions, including:

- How does the school's theologically rooted Christian vision enable pupils and adults to flourish?
- How is collective worship enabling pupils and adults to flourish spiritually?
- How does the school's theologically rooted Christian vision create a culture in which pupils and adults are treated well?

SIAMS inspection focuses on the impact of the Church school's Christian vision on pupils and adults.

A few quotes from recent inspections in the Diocese of York:

- "The Christian vision with its strong biblical roots is clearly understood and articulated by the whole school community. Led by a passionate headteacher, leaders ensure the vision is at the core of every aspect of school life."
- "Inspired by their vision, staff welcome pupils as unique seeds. The development of the whole child is paramount. Talents are recognised and nourished and as a result all flourish as compassionate and confident learners."
- "Pupils and adults value the many invitational opportunities to come together for celebration, reflection and prayer. As a result, collective worship contributes significantly to spiritual flourishing."
- "Well planned religious education (RE) ensures a sequenced and balanced curriculum which enables pupils to flourish. It develops a good knowledge of major religions and Christianity as a global faith."

The Rt Revd Paul Ferguson, Bishop of Whitby, reflects on the beginning of our journey of Lent.

A few months ago, some of us marked the centenary of the consecration of the first Bishop of Whitby by a four-day walk from Whitby to Lastingham. On the way, we noticed different things, met different people, and had different conversations. But we were all on the same journey.

For me, Lent is rather like that. We are all on the same Bible journey from Jesus's baptism and testing in the wilderness to his arrest and death. As Jesus lived out his utter devotion to God the Father and his self-giving love for humankind, so we—if we accept the call to growing more like Christ—can use this time to hold a mirror up to our relationship with Jesus, and ask whether we really look like people who know that we belong to God.

We can do this in different ways. For example, one is to give time to reviewing each day, giving thanks for the signs of God's glory we have seen in people, places, experiences, and asking 'How has my walk with God been today?'

Another is to take the Sunday gospel readings, and give generous time to imagining ourselves in the crowd, journeying with Jesus, amazed at what he has done and said.

What about thinking afresh about our prayer life, or our giving? And although for some people doing without treats in Lent might seem quaint, actually it can be a way of challenging ourselves about whether we control our likes and preferences, or whether they control us.

So I hope that we could positively welcome Lent. Lent is a serious time, but it's not a gloomy time. Lent is a time for being realistic about our sinful failure to follow the will of God, but (like the whole of a healthy Christian faith) it's not about being loaded with crushing, useless guilt — it's a time for being open to God's forgiveness, and celebrating his love.

Is 'doing Lent' easy? Like anything that has a note of discipline about it, very likely not. But it's a valuable few weeks, and I hope you have a truly blessed Lent this year.

Make our hearts clean, O God; and renew a right spirit within us.



Cuthbert - An award-winning film

North Yorkshire film-maker and ordinand Oliver Murray won a 'Panel Award' award at the Sheffield Christian Film and Media Festival in October for his independently-produced short film 'Cuthbert', about the early English saint.

Oliver spoke at the Festival about the power of cinema to tell the Christian story in fresh ways, and ultimately to re-enchant audiences with the power of Christ's story.

"The film was a joy to make," said Oliver. "It took a great deal of work as it was made entirely by myself, but I'm happy with the finished piece and have been very moved by the attention which the film has received online without any major promotion."

"The film is missional, evangelistic (in rather a different way)," he adds.

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The author of the <u>saintsofthenorth.co.uk</u> blog says, "I'm fascinated by the saints local to my region, a time when the Celtic Christians and those from Rome were invited amongst the pagan Anglo-Saxons to show a violent warrior people The Way."

Oliver's epic short film, shot over two days and edited over four months has been inspired by Saint Cuthbert's mystical story. It aims to depict the orthodox Christian vision afresh, touching upon the battles we all still face today.

"I'm fascinated by the early medieval era in the history of my island home," adds Oliver. "A world of miracles and of enchantment, of living alongside nature rather than athwart to it, of Gandalf-like figures and of deeply symbolic stories. I'm unapologetic about that. I don't think life is all about comfort."

A defibrillator is a portable device that can give a casualty's heart an electric shock, when it has stopped beating. They are often located in public places such as old telephone boxes, on the walls of village halls, or outside pubs and shops, but they are increasingly found attached to church buildings.

Greer Parker, leader of York St Chad's 28th Brownies, said:

"We were doing our First Aid badge, and realised our nearest defibrillator was a good 10-minute walk away. We decided to raise some money to get one here, and straight away, one of our Sixers [brownie leaders] decided to do a sponsored running-up-and-down-the-stairs!"

The group were given £1,500 from Tesco's Community Fund, where customers are given a blue token to vote for their favourite charity to receive a grant.

The Revd Simon Bray, Priest in Charge of the Bishopthorpe Road parishes, said:

"It was brilliant to see the Brownies' enthusiasm for raising these important funds. It's great for the church to be a resource and a blessing to our community."
