In October 2022, the Bishops and Archdeacons committed to inviting a selection of parishes to join Revitalise – a Diocesan Living Christ's Story initiative. It is a programme which accompanies parishes for two years on a journey to grow missionally and financially. Revitalise invites everyone in the local church community to play a part.

Ian Nursey, who is taking part in Revitalise with the Benefice of Skirlaugh, reflects on his experience so far.

"Being part of Revitalise has meant that we have joined a community of other likeminded benefices and churches to receive ideas, tools and inspiration to help us explore ways to grow our churches and become more effective in our mission and pastoral work. We have shared our experiences of the difficulties we face and the successes we can achieve in our ministry.

"Our Deanery Leadership Team worked hard to develop a plan of how we can live Christ's story. And being part of Revitalise is enabling us to convert that plan into achievable actions in our churches and communities. "In the autumn, members from all eight of our benefice churches spent a day together where we explored hopes and ideas for mission and ministry across our own parishes. Whilst we all recognised and shared many of the problems of rural ministry, we enjoyed positive and exciting conversations about how we can contribute to our deanery plan and how we can grow our ministry. We have created a long list of opportunities: some of them easy to do – and already in action – and some more difficult.

"We have ideas and actions for benefice-wide pastoral, prayer or teaching groups to strengthen us as one church; we are exploring how we can grow families and children's activities and events from our schools and looking at ways we can use our beautiful buildings for the benefit of our wider communities."

Volunteers at the Genesis Project in Middlesbrough have been awarded the King's Award for Voluntary Service, known as 'the MBE for volunteer groups'. It is one of 262 local charities, social enterprises and voluntary groups to receive the prestigious award this year. Earlier this year, more than 30 volunteers were presented with their awards by the Lord Lieutenant of North Yorkshire, Jo Ropner.

The Genesis Project, lead by the Revd Kath Dean, is a community hub in Grove Hill, Middlesbrough. Beginning as a kids' club, the Genesis Project has grown into a vital local resource, providing for both the material and spiritual needs of the community. From their base at St Oswald's Church Hall, Kath and the team offer a safe social space, kids clubs, and holiday clubs with food, toys, and clothes supplied and donated by both local and national businesses. The Eco Shop, run by Shaun Sidgwick, provides the equivalent of a full week's shop - food, toiletries, household essentials – for £4. The mission which underpins all that the Genesis Project is, is to be a positive force by empowering the community through creating a safe place, with a Christian caring approach for the whole person and their needs.

David Kerfoot, a Deputy Lieutenant who assessed the Genesis Project for the King's Award, said, "I don't think I've ever seen a group of people more deserving of this award. When I walked through that door, the thing that struck me was how enthusiastic everyone is. Everyone works so well together - the effort, support, and compassion for the community is so special."

Receiving the certificate and award crystal, Kath said, "All the glory goes to God in this. This is such a special award, and in my 70th year, it's telling me, "You're not past it yet!" A lot of the volunteers came here first for help, and now they're helping others. That's what Genesis is about - it's not just about feeding people and giving people clothes, it's about lifting people up."





Praying for the Whole People of God

In our Prayer Diary, we pray each day for churches, schools and other communities across our diocese. When we do this, we pray for the whole people of God in that place - all those who lead and serve, those who worship, and those in the wider community.

Diocesan South African Link

The Diocese of York is twinned with three Dioceses in South Africa - Cape Town, False Bay and Saldanha Bay. The Diocese of Saldanha Bay is linked with the Archdeaconry of York, False Bay with the Archdeaconry of Cleveland, and the Diocese of Cape Town with the Archdeaconry of East Riding. The purpose of the link is to encourage one another, in a mutual concern to help each other in our mission to make Christ's love known. We are committing to pray for communities in South Africa each week in our Diocesan Prayer Diary.

Porvoo Communion

The Porvoo Communion is a communion of 15 Anglican and Evangelical Lutheran churches in Europe. The communion was established in 1992 by a theological agreement entitled the Porvoo Common Statement which establishes full communion between and among these churches. The Porvoo Declaration commits the churches which have signed it 'to share a common life' and 'to pray for and with one another'. Festival of Faith and Music comes to York

York is to host the first-ever Church Times Festival of Faith and Music in partnership with the Royal School of Church Music (RSCM) this coming week (26-28 April 2024).

The Festival brings together a stimulating programme of music and worship, talks and workshops over a weekend celebrating church music in all its glory – hoping to send delegates home encouraged, inspired and equipped with new and practical ideas.

An exciting and engaging range of speakers, discussions, and workshops will include a keynote speech by the Archbishop of York and dedicated services held in York Minster. A choice of workshops will run on subjects as diverse as taking your church choir into the community, using music to support your church's engagement with dementia, caring for a pipe organ, choosing hymns, and growing the church younger through music. Top-flight professional singers James Gilchrist and Andrea Haines will contribute, both of whom began their singing lives in parish church choirs, as well as Victoria Johnson, Alexander L'Estrange, and The Ebor Singers.

The Festival is for music leaders, clergy, and anyone with a general interest in sacred music, and will be a source of celebration, inspiration, encouragement, and resource.

Festival Director Sarah Meyrick (Church Times) said: "Building on our many years' experience running our Festivals of Preaching and of Faith and Literature we're delighted to be adding this new event to our stable. Over the weekend there will be a rich menu of interesting sessions, delivered by some excellent speakers. We're very much looking forward to welcoming festival-goers to York for what should be a very stimulating couple of days."

Hugh Morris (Director, RSCM) added: "I am delighted that we are working together with the Church Times to put on this new Festival. Music is such an important part of worship, and we have put together a wide range of sessions on topics which we hope will appeal to music leaders, clergy leaders, and church music lovers alike. I am sure it will be a really engaging and interesting weekend and am myself already looking forward to attending."



"God loves you." Bishop Michael Baughen whispered those words just after he laid hands on me, at my ordination as priest in Chester Cathedral. It took me aback: the words of the service were all scripted, we had been carefully rehearsed, and everything seemed so formal. And then a secret whisper: 'God loves you.'

It's now 29 years since I first came to York, as Precentor at the Minster. As cathedral canon, archdeacon and bishop, I have met so many extraordinary and wonderful people; seen people grow in faith, discipleship and ministry; and I have had the best colleagues that anyone could wish for. Like any minister, I have been with people at the turning points of life, and when its troubles and confusions have threatened to overwhelm them. And you have been there for me too — thank you.

Paul wrote to the Romans: 'We, who are many, are one body in Christ, and individually we are members one of another. We have gifts that differ according to the grace given to us: prophecy, in proportion to faith; ministry, in ministering; the teacher, in teaching; the exhorter, in exhortation; the giver, in generosity; the leader, in diligence; the compassionate, in cheerfulness.'

Paul could have been writing to us, with all our different abilities and responsibilities. Whatever your role, you will have concerns that can be daunting. But being God's co-workers, the ambassadors and messengers of God's love, is the reason why we do all the work, why we run the projects, why we have all those meetings.

It has been such a privilege to be part of this diocese's life and work. I'm confident that God has more great opportunities in store. And whatever happens along the way, especially if it's tough at times, hear the whisper: God loves you.

2024 is the Revd Melanie Burnside's first full year in the post described as "unusual and exciting" – and one of her tasks is to explain to people exactly what her job is. Melanie's job title is "Interim Priest in Charge – Joint Anglican–Methodist churches Helmsley area", but when people in the Ryedale market town at the heart of her 'patch' ask her if she's "the new Vicar of Helmsley," she says, "I minister at All Saints' and more..."

It's so much more; Melanie looks after the Church of England parishes of Helmsley (including Sproxton, Rievaulx and East Moors) and of Upper Ryedale (Bilsdale, Cold Kirkby, Hawnby, Old Byland and Scawton), and is also the authorised presbyter to the Methodist Churches of Helmsley and Rievaulx - that's nine Anglican and two Methodist churches altogether.

Enabled by the 2003 Covenant between the Methodist Church and the Church of England, the two leadership teams reached agreement for a joint post serving the eleven churches, initially for three years with the possibility of a further three-year extension; they found the ideal candidate almost on their doorstep in Melanie Burnside, who had been Curate in the neighbouring Kirkdale group of churches.

Melanie grew up in Derbyshire but has lived and worked in North Yorkshire for over twenty years, fifteen in a small family agricultural business before she was ordained in 2021; her own Christian faith was shaped in the Methodist tradition and drew her to be ordained in the Church of England, with a strong appreciation of the different perspectives each church embodies.

"It's a creative solution to make the most of our resources. It's not my job to merge the distinct church congregations, but to encourage them all to be engaged with the community in the world." she says.

Support for Melanie's post comes both from within the churches and from the wider community. Helmsley's representative on North Yorkshire Council, Councillor George Jabbour, comments, "Since the start, I have been a big supporter of this pioneering arrangement and was absolutely delighted to welcome the Revd Melanie Burnside to her new role during her Licensing and Installation service in November on behalf of the residents of Helmsley."

Melanie comments, "I'm already enjoying getting to know the different communities around the churches," she says, "and I'm excited to see how the opportunities of 2024 will unfold as we explore this new arrangement together."

Celebrating Ordinations at Petertide

The Revd Canon Nick Bird, Diocesan Adviser for Vocations, reflects on the upcoming ordinations at Petertide.

The Church sets aside particular people to serve the people of God, to lead them in worship, and to enable them in ministry. Whether Deacons or Priests, the Church seeks out those whose deeps roots of discipleship have developed into the green shoots of service, ministry, and mission, those who are seeking to set God's people free in every way. By tradition many are ordained at Petertide toward the end of June, and our diocese is no different.

The feast of St Peter (also the dedication of York Minster) reminds us that the unlikely and unpredictable are called into leadership in the Church – rough, unready, seemingly unsuitable – and yet the Christian community has discerned a love for people and God, a call to ministry, wisdom, fruitfulness and potential. These are people whom we have trained, and whom we shall trust.

At Petertide this year we look forward to the possibility of ordaining young and old, those with high academic achievements and those with hard-won practical wisdom, priests,

transitional deacons (those whom we anticipate ordaining priest at a later time) and those whose ministry is to the Distinctive Diaconate.

Please pray for all those being discerned, formed and trained for ordained ministry, for they cannot bear the weight of this calling in their own strength, but only by the grace and power of God.

'Priests are ordained to lead God's people in the offering of praise and the proclamation of the gospel. They share with the Bishop in the oversight of the Church, delighting in its beauty and rejoicing in its well-being. They are to set the example of the Good Shepherd always before them as the pattern of their calling. With the Bishop and their fellow presbyters, they are to sustain the community of the faithful by the ministry of word and sacrament, that we all may grow into the fullness of Christ and be a living sacrifice acceptable to God.'

Fortunately for the Church, the Trade Descriptions Act does not apply to us, otherwise I wonder sometimes whether we might be liable for a complaint under it?! The Church is so many things. We are:

- at the heart of our community, a local cohesive force for good
- a place where God can be known and worshipped
- the Church of England, there for everyone
- the Institutional Church, on hand for civic and national events
- the Diocese, a collaborative organisational network

All of this is true and it's all part of the picture of being church. But does any of this actually get to the heart of what church is, and what it's for? The Acts of the Apostles depicts the church as a group of people who became convinced that Jesus Christ was the Son of God and they were completely transformed by their encounter with him and with his Holy Spirit. Their lives were shaped by Christ and, as we say in our diocese, they set out individually and together, to Live Christ's Story. Living for him, and with him, was their priority.

The Church has many purposes and different ways of expressing itself. There is so much we can offer, so many ways that we can serve. We may need, though, to come back to the 'core business' of church, of knowing Jesus and the power of his Holy Spirit. OHP was founded as an educational order in 1915, adopting St Hilda as inspiration and guide; part of the great flowering of girls' education around the turn of the 20th century.

The Community was placed under a dedication to the parakletos = "the one called to come alongside". Think Emergency Services - Police, Fire, Ambulance - for the name had one legal and two maritime uses. The Legal Aid lawyer called to a courtroom to defend someone without representation, a small boat called into a sea battle to grapple fireboats away from the fleet and a bigger boat called out to a small boat in difficulties to guide it into harbour.



Like other communities founded to provide institutions of support and care that are now functions of the state and business, today the OHP Sisters are more into "along-siding" others, not least in an age-old monastic tradition of Hospitality; monasteries were the "Premier Inns" of the ancient trade routes.

At the time of writing we are approaching Lent, the season of deliberately being alongside Jesus as he takes on the Salvation of the World. We are also awaiting a new window in Chapel in which the Cross is central and around it the wind of the Spirit blows across the moors. This memorial window will honour all who have been alongside us through the years.

May the Spirit be with you!

The Revd Jane Speck, Chaplain at the University of York, shares her experiences and asks for our prayer.

Chaplaincy is a ministry that is first and foremost about tea and cake. A sizeable proportion of my time, as Chaplain at York St John, is spent chatting over a cuppa (and occasionally a pint, if it's Beer+Bible night...) with a student or staff member. It's an enviable task but of course, as with all swimming ducks, there is a lot more going on under the surface. The privilege of any Chaplaincy is that we are available to every single person in our institution, whether they profess a faith or not. And not just those of our own faith, but everyone.

Along with my team of part time staff and volunteers, I provide for the religious needs of all groups in the University. As well as running the Chapel and its services, this also includes managing a Muslim Prayer Room; developing a Dharmic Prayer Room for Hindu, Sikh and Buddhist members of York St John; providing

space for Pagan students to celebrate Imbolc on campus; running secular Mindfulness sessions for those who want to learn to meditate but shy away from the spiritual element – and many other eclectic, sometimes unexpected requests!

York St John University has an Anglican foundation, and therefore an Anglican Chaplain. The Chaplaincy serves the whole community not in order to make Christians of them, but because we are Christians and it is our calling to serve. This can be challenging, sometimes requiring careful thought and prayer, but is ultimately enriching and hugely enjoyable. We are blessed with a team of Faith Advisers from all the major world faiths, and together we try to model positive, affirming interfaith relationships to the rest of the University.

Our service on the first Sunday of each month is planned by a lay team. The worship style is informal and creative.

When we enter January, we are bombarded with ideas for New Year Resolutions, but statistics show that 80% of these fail by February. The planning team felt it would be good to put our focus on our walk with Jesus who never fails us, and the Rhythm of Life resources on the Diocesan website provided a great framework.

We started the service with space for each of us to consider the principles of Christian living identified in the Rhythm of Life resources and mark ourselves from 1 to 5 according to how well we feel we are meeting them. The sermon was based on John 15: 7-9,11 and our prayer time led us through each of the six principles with space for us to reflect and seek God's guidance and encouragement.

We each took a Rhythm of Life commitment card home to pray through over the following week and mark up the actions we plan to take to move our scores from 1 to 5 during 2024. The cards have great practical suggestions of steps we can take to build the six principles into our daily life.

In our January Café Church service, we focused on one of the six principles, Generosity, and explored how God calls us to joyfully discern where we should give our time, talents, and resources.

We have found the Rhythm of Life a really useful tool for spiritual reflection, and would recommend it to other churches and individuals wanting a framework for growing in faith.

A group of churches in the Byland Benefice gathered recently for an interesting workshop on Leading Intercessions.

Leading Intercessions is an integral part of our church's pattern of worship. It is something which we are called to do as Christian people - to pray for the needs of the Church and the world. Leading Intercessions in churches therefore holds a particular responsibility, in leading others in prayer and enabling communities to join together in this ministry.

It was therefore decided in the Byland Benefice that hosting a workshop on how to lead Intercessions would be valuable. The morning was aimed at both those who already lead Intercessions, and those who are interested in doing so. The session covered what Intercessions are in the context of worship, how to form them with a framework. and how we use language when we lead others in prayer. There were also opportunities to explore how we can be creative in offering Intercessions, including the use of imagery, music and movement.

Liz Crawshaw, who attended the workshop,

"It was so positive to have the workshop as a Benefice event, and a wonderful celebration of our seven churches gathering together. The teaching we were offered by the diocesan Discipleship Adviser was extraordinarily helpful and inspirational for everyone, including those who had been leading intercessions for many years. We were given frameworks, advice on preparation presentation and resources and some wonderfully creative ideas. When we used the example of Taize music, most people either hummed or sang - we felt very aware of God's presence with us.

"As I looked around the room I saw eyes shining with possibilities and as we gathered at the end of the morning overheard lots of conversations which started "Shall we try...." We left feeling thoroughly blessed."

A Pastoral Letter from the Bishop of Selby, the Rt Revd Dr John Thomson.

We all live in stories as the TV soaps and other drama show us. The key question is which is our number one story?

For Christians our number one story must be Christ's Story and we discover our part in this story as we 'hang around with Jesus' as former Archbishop Rowan Williams' puts it.

This story inspired me as a young person growing up in Uganda and in ministry in Sheffield, South Africa, Doncaster and latterly the Diocese of York. In these settings I have discovered a living story for people from all over the world, a story of love, hope, forgiveness and self-giving service.

In life there are other stories competing to be our number one story such as family, nation, sport and career. Yet none of these last and each will let us down and when made number one shut us off from God.

That's why living Christ's story together is so important since this is God's story which globally and historically has persuaded more people of its truthfulness than any other story, which lasts for eternity and which puts each of these other stories in their proper penultimate place. So as I move into a new phase of my own story as a follower of Jesus Christ, I shall continue to pray that together we will always have Christ as our number one story.



The annual festival of Hilda's Heirs returned in March to York, marking International Women's Day and celebrating women of faith who have gone before us.

Held in partnership between the Diocese of York, York Minster, and Yorkshire North and East Methodist district, the festival celebrated the vision of women who have gone before us, and sought to inspire women and girls in leadership in the Church and the wider world today. Aligned with the vision of International Women's Day, the day celebrates and affirms women and girls, whilst raising issues and taking action against gender inequality and discrimination. tend to be more prominent. These two trails, created for the festival, are now available for everyone throughout the year.

The festival also included acts of worship which anchored the day, including reflections on St Hilda and empowerment of women and girls.

Throughout the day, women who are in various forms of leadership, including Rachel Maskell MP, Steph Cooper (Refugee Action York), Penny Stables (Green Councillor), and Kiera Snaith (project leader from Carecent), hosted a market place which offered conversation and activities.

The Revd Catriona Cumming, Succentor at York Minster, said: "We were delighted to be part of this amazing festival, celebrating and encouraging the leadership of women and girls in our communities. It was a brilliant day of creativity, conversation and celebration."
