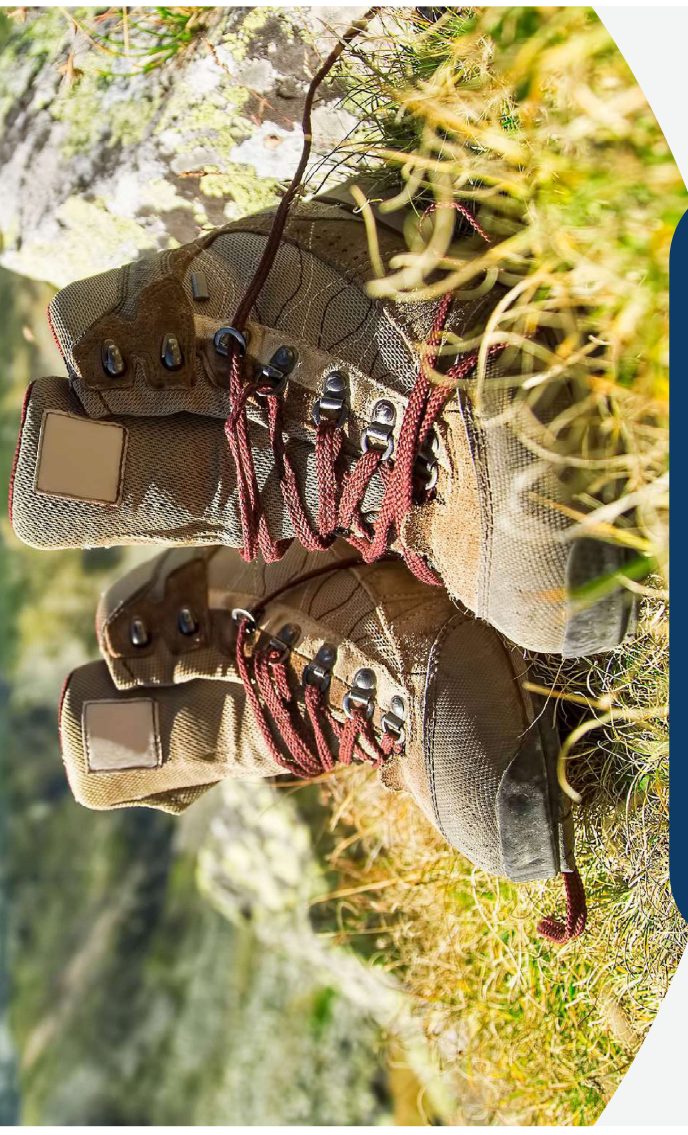

## Sharing God's love at York Pride

Churches across the Diocese of York joined together at the start of June to take part in York Pride. Under the banner of 'Christians at Pride', dozens of Christians from a variety of denominations took part in the parade and ran one of over 150 stalls during the festival.

The free event, first held in York in 2012, begins with a gathering in York city centre and a parade to the Knavesmire Racecourse. There, they are greeted with music, food, stalls, games, and more, all celebrating the LGBTQ+ community.

York Minster held a 'pre-pride' event the evening before, allowing after-hours access to the cathedral followed by compline. Alistair, a singer in the choir at York Minster, said the service was "a great opportunity for people who might have never set foot in the Minster before to come and look around. It's fantastic to welcome people into the Minster and to think about what the following day might bring."

One participant highlighted the importance of a strong Christian presence at Pride: "I think it's a wonderful example of an ecumenical gathering with one purpose – to let people know that they are loved by God. We never know who we might encounter, or how much someone might need to hear that they are loved, affirmed, and celebrated for the wonderful person that God has created them to be."

A worshipping community for LGBTQ+ Christians based at St Luke's, York – outsideIN – helped to organise the day's activities. Visitors to the Christians at Pride stall added white hearts with their names to a banner (pictured) which read 'I am wonderfully made', echoing the words of Psalm 139.

A volunteer on the stall said, "It was such a privilege to be part of Pride 2024. We were positioned right by the main stage so were able to share in the music and acts while also welcoming people into our tent to talk about the ways that our churches are engaging with the LGBTQ+ community."

### Praying for the Whole People of God

In our Prayer Diary, we pray each day for churches, schools and other communities across our diocese. When we do this, we pray for the whole people of God in that place - all those who lead and serve, those who worship, and those in the wider community.

### Diocesan South African Link

The Diocese of York is twinned with three Dioceses in South Africa - Cape Town, False Bay and Saldanha Bay. The Diocese of Saldanha Bay is linked with the Archdeaconry of York, False Bay with the Archdeaconry of Cleveland, and the Diocese of Cape Town with the Archdeaconry of East Riding. The purpose of the link is to encourage one another, in a mutual concern to help each other in our mission to make Christ's love known. We are committing to pray for communities in South Africa each week in our Diocesan Prayer Diary.

### Porvoo Communion

The Porvoo Communion is a communion of 15 Anglican and Evangelical Lutheran churches in Europe. The communion was established in 1992 by a theological agreement entitled the Porvoo Common Statement which establishes full communion between and among these churches. The Porvoo Declaration commits the churches which have signed it 'to share a common life' and 'to pray for and with one another'. 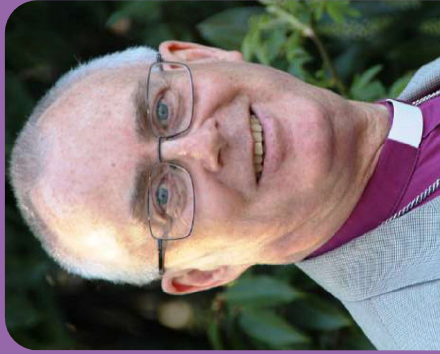

## Giving thanks for the Ministries of Bishop Paul and Bishop John

Archbishop Stephen gives thanks, marking the retirement of Bishop Paul and Bishop John.



It is with thanksgiving for long and faithful ministries that we bid farewell to Bishop Paul and Bishop John, who retired at the end of July. Their ten years (each!) of episcopal ministry has been with faithfulness to their calling and hope in God; they have cared for their clergy and people and preached the Good News of the Gospel with grace and courage.

They have brought a richness to this diocese, each one in his own way: Bishop Paul with his love of liturgy and music, his commitment to schools and education, his skill in speaking different languages and his engagement with the ecumenical community; Bishop John with his passion for our South African link dioceses, and his tireless advocating for rural communities and the environment, his profound understanding of the local.

They have both exemplified what it means for a bishop to be a pastor and a teacher.

Each of them spoke movingly of their ministry at the Chrism Eucharist this year, and perhaps what struck me is their faithfulness to God and God's calling. I think this is because they truly embody the verse in Hebrews: 'Let us hold unwaveringly to the hope we profess, for he who promised is faithful' (Heb. 10:23).

Throughout their ministry and all the challenges that come with it, they have held out for us an offering of hope. Let us pray that God will continue to grow this hope in them as they enter a new phase in ministry and in life. And may we continue to learn from them as we have been so blessed by their ministry and leadership.

Both Bishop Paul and Bishop John will say their farewells to the Diocese of York at 5.30pm Evensong in York Minster on Tuesday 16th July 2024. All are welcome.

## The Diocese of York Celebrates Generosity Week 2024

This year's Generosity Week runs from 29th September to 6th October. It spans two Sundays; one to consider how much God abundantly and freely gives us, and the other to consider our response to that generosity.

When we consider the work of farmers and farm workers, and the planned annual sowing and reaping, it is a beautiful analogy of how annual planned events reap such rewards. God has created nature to work in such a mutual way that each element benefits the other. So it is with us - we each have skills, interests, experience, energy and resources to offer that can create communities that are transformed in positive and life-giving ways.

There is a wealth of free resources and ideas for church leaders and their communities on the Church of England's website, and additional

resources on the Diocese of York's website. The latter includes a series of short videos, using a set of themes for each day, loosely following the pattern of themes in the Generosity Week Morning Prayer series, to help us reflect on different aspects of generous giving.

Generosity Week coincides with Harvest, but as we are called to be generous 365 days a year, we can plan a set time when we know our communities would respond best. The Generous Giving team are here for support and advice, please be in touch.

## Celebrating thirty years of women's priestly ministry in the Diocese of York

On 4th June 2024, several hundred lay people and clergy gathered to give thanks for the first thirty years of women's priestly ministry in Diocese of York, at Evensong in York Minster.

Archbishop of York Stephen Cottrell was present and gave a blessing at the end, and the preacher was the Revd Canon Sue Sheriff, one of the 39 women ordained priest in York Minster in May 1994 and now Priest-in-Charge of St Oswald's, Fulford, York. Around sixty ordained women joined Archbishop Stephen on York Minster's south steps for a photograph afterwards, followed by a smaller group of seventeen of those ordained priest in 1994, including a number of those ordained in York.

The Revd Jenny Wright, Chaplain to the Archbishop of York, writes, "This year marks the 30th anniversary of the ordination of women to the Priesthood. We recently celebrated this in York, joined by 32 priests who were among those women ordained in 1994, some of them in our own diocese.

"While the specific reason for gathering was to celebrate women as priests, it was also a reminder to celebrate ministry in the most

generous of ways. For through baptism we are all invited to participate in God's mission in this world through our discipleship and our ministry. Although some are set apart through ordained ministry (and we give thanks to God for these women and men), we all minister in different ways and thus help to accentuate the diversity of the Body of Christ.

"We are all called to prayerful obedience. Just as the first women who discovered the empty tomb on Easter Sunday ran off to proclaim the Good News, so we need to bold in our telling of the Christian story. In the midst of the celebration, we recognise too that there is still a lack of diversity (not only of gender, but race, class, disability and sexuality) and that to remain true to our calling we need to again and again come to the foot of the cross, lamenting our brokenness, celebrating our change, and courageously seeking to be the people God is calling us to be.

"Let us give God thanks that every one of us has a part to play in God's plan!"

## Pastoral Letter

*A Pastoral Letter from the Dean of York,  
The Very Revd Dominic Barrington.*

September is very much a time of new beginnings. Young children get ready for their first day at school, and another generation of undergraduates embark on life at college or university. When I worked in the Episcopal Church in the US, it was common to speak of the new 'program year' (sic!), and even though such language is less common in the C of E, there is a sense of people returning to the pews after time away on holiday. And this year, a new government and House of Commons will be settling in to the many tasks it faces after the summer parliamentary recess.

Our journey with Jesus this September is also one which demands us to regroup and focus anew on his call to us, both as individuals and as communities. On the five Sundays this month contains, the gospel readings we will hear in church come from the middle of Mark, and each passage is one which demands some kind of fresh start. Jesus demands a re-evaluation of traditions taken for granted; a widening of our view about inclusivity; a new approach to losing and saving one's life; a new perspective on what it means to be great.

I hope that as this month unfolds for you and that part of the Body of Christ to which you belong, you will be reinvigorated as you hear anew Jesus' call to discipleship, and that, across this diocese we might be find ever more wonderful ways to Live Christ's Story.

## Celebrating thirty years of women's priestly ministry in the Diocese of York



**The Revd Canon Sue Sheriff reflected on her thirty years as a priest:**

I have just surprised myself by getting very emotional while celebrating the first Sunday Communion since the 30th anniversary of being ordained as a priest.

It took me right back to the day after the priesting in 1994 when I celebrated my first Communion.

As I looked out that Sunday morning from behind the communion table at many of the people who had supported me through my Christian journey and vocation to be a priest, I was overwhelmed with compassion for the flock for which Jesus had asked me to care.

It felt a massive responsibility for which even after 7 years as a deacon I felt ill-prepared and unworthy.

I took confidence from the fact that the day before in a packed York Minster my bishop and many colleagues had laid hands on me as the bishop said, "Send down the Holy Spirit upon your servant Suzanne for the office and work of a priest in your Church."

Together with some incredible Godly women I was ordained alongside. I had been interviewed to see if both the Church and we ourselves felt that God has called us to the distinctively different role of priest. In the ordination service we had been presented by the archdeacon to the bishop, and by the bishop to the people as he asked, is it your will that they should be ordained priest?

There had been a resounding "It is" that felt like it could have almost lifted the roof off our beautiful cathedral.

At the end of today's Communion I once again felt humbled and overwhelmed with compassion as we sang the lines "I will go, Lord, if you lead me. I will hold your people in my heart" and for me that sums up what the last 30 years have been about.

## Celebrating thirty years of women's priestly ministry in the Diocese of York

The Revd Canon Angela Bailey, another of those ordained in York Minster in 1994, recalls:



One feeling I have looking back on these years of women in priestly orders is deep respect for the women before us, and gratitude. Archbishop Runcie ordained as deacon in February 1987 women who were by then retired, together with us newbies. Some of these elder women had decades of faithful ministry behind them, models of service in places where they were not seen in the sanctuary nor heard in the liturgy.

We had a few years of 'permanent diaconate' as it was called then, before the ordination to priesthood. I was struck then and since by the way we needed to be light on our feet, adapting, developing theological thinking, learning new skills, to fulfil what the church was now calling us to. Of course, that's true of all Christians, witnessing 'afresh in each generation', and these first ordinations came after a lot of liturgical revision so some folk were used to new perspectives. Not everyone likes change though!

Beginning as a deaconess I never expected to be 'in charge', there were few such posts – and yet we were called to leadership and had to step up. I hope this helped me to nurture the gifts of those who were tempted to keep their lights under a bushel. One great joy of my ministry has been to see people grow in their following Jesus, and answering his call on their lives.

The Eucharist has always been central in my own faith and to preside, to serve in that way is a privilege. The prayer of Jesus that we may be one is focussed in the Eucharist and is key to our witness that God was in Christ reconciling the world to God-self. For me this is the heart of our faith and our calling in the church, whatever our role in the celebration, to be together at the Eucharist. Speaking God's word of peace wherever we are serving is my prayer in pastoral work, which is my main role now.

So gratitude for the women before us, a sense of being light-footed on the Way, sharing the journey and seeing others grow into maturity in Christ, speaking God's word of peace and seeking unity in the Eucharist – these have been the themes of these past years. I've served with and among great folk – thank you.

## Derwent gets muddy planting new trees

Earlier in the spring, local school children came together to help. The Revd Jackie Doyle-Brett, Area Dean of Derwent, plant new trees in the grounds of the church.

Jackie writes,

"Forest Church and Muddy Church are national church initiatives to help people connect to God through the natural world. Many people around us find that their most profoundly spiritual moments are when they are outdoors, in nature. Muddy Church is a place for people to gather outdoors and to connect with the space and God.

"We at St Michaels and All Angels Sutton upon Derwent have been blessed recently with some great volunteer work to create a woodland church area for use by children and adults. By necessity we needed to remove some trees and the woodland area was created by using the felled trees to create the new landscape. It is hoped that as this area matures it will provide a haven of quiet contemplation but also a place for children to explore the biodiversity of God's creation and connect to God through nature.

"Recently I invited the school to join us to plant trees donated by the Woodland Trust for our woodland church area. It was a very cold (but dry!) March morning and the children were very keen to get digging and planting. The worked in pairs – one to dig and one to plant. I explained that sometimes trees need to be removed but it was very important that we replaced them. We talked about how they were helping the environment and how God asked us to look after the wonderful gift of creation. We also talked about our two new 5 star 'bug hotels!' This project is very much part of the

Treasure mark of mission and how we can contribute to looking after our world.

"We hosted an outdoor service on Sunday the 30th of June at 4pm where we were able to use the woodland church space for our children's activity for the first time!"

## Pastoral Letter

**A Pastoral Letter from the Venerable Sam Rushton, Archdeacon of the York.**

*No man is an island,*

*Entire of itself;*

*Every man is a piece of the continent,*

*A part of the main.*



These words written 400 years ago this year by John Donne are as redolent of meaning and challenge today as they have ever been. This year also marks the 80th anniversary of DDay, a testimony both to what happens when one power tries to exert its individualism over another but also the remarkable things which can be achieved when people of different nations work together in the fight against evil.

We have a sporting summer ahead of us as I write. The Olympics and Paralympics in Paris, the Euros in Germany, the men's and women's T20 Cricket World Cup in the US and West Indies and Bangladesh will all see British teams battling for European or World supremacy, not on killing fields but on sports grounds around the world. Men and women of all shapes and sizes, races and creeds, will come together in a glorious pageant of effort and skill, reaping the rewards of long hours of practice, attention to diet and health, and sacrifice. The sporting great will eat together, train together, test one another – as iron sharpens iron so their giftedness and their skill will urge one another on to be the best that they can be.

When we come together as disciples of Christ we go beyond what we can achieve alone. We encourage one another, we challenge one another, we cheer on those who are flagging and raise up those who fall. And surrounding us is that great cloud of witnesses who cheer us on, the communion of saints praying and praising with us the God who is love.

So let us not be islands of individual faith but let's go out there and show who we can be and what we can achieve together on the world, national and local stage. Keep your eyes fixed on Jesus and run your race well.

## Global-Majority Heritage and UK Minority Ethnic clergy gather at Bishopthorpe

Archbishop Stephen recently welcomed clergy, ordinands and church leaders of global-majority heritage or UK minority-ethnic from the Northern Province of the Church of England to Bishopthorpe Palace for a day of celebration, conversation, and worship.

The event was organised and delivered by the Rt Revd Smitha Prasadam, Bishop of Huddersfield, and the Rt Revd Arun Arora, Bishop of Kirkstall. During the day, Archbishop Stephen gave an address on 'The Theology of Diversity' and said: "Gathered here, we can look around and discover that we belong to one another. We are one humanity. We can also receive the help, guidance and friendship we need. Our meeting here is part of our ongoing commitment to celebrate the calling that God has put on each of our lives, to listen and learn from our experiences and together begin to shape the Church I believe God wants us to be. Thank you for all you do to bring the life of the church and to share the Good News of Jesus Christ in the communities where you live and serve".

The Revd Rob Suekarran, Associate Vicar at Hull Minster, comments on the day. "What an amazing privilege it was to be part of the Northern Global Majority Heritage and

UKME Clergy and Ordinands Gathering at Bishopthorpe Palace. This was a truly momentous and historic day, as it was the first time that any such gathering has occurred, which is both a cause for celebration and lament.

"The day began with Morning Prayer which reflected the vibrancy and diversity of those gathered, with vibrant, heartfelt, sung worship and liturgy which reflected our diversity. The chapel was bouncing! This was followed by group discussions centred around a video made by a rapper, expertly facilitated by Bishop Smitha, which led to helpful (but painful) reflection on some of the issues faced by GMH people and clergy in our churches.

"Archbishop Stephen, Bishop Arun, and others, shared some helpful (and at times shocking) stories of their experiences within the church. It turns out that Bishop Arun constantly gets confused for being a taxi driver. I wonder why that is? I was so moved by our time together that I cried on the way back to my car (luckily, I had to leave a little early so it was a little less embarrassing), such was the magnitude of the day and all that it represented, both personally for me, but also for my brothers and sisters in Christ, and for the church."

## Young People Commissioned as Youth Discipleship Ambassadors for the Diocese

The Revd Donneta Thomas, Curate at the Benefice of Northallerton with Kirby Sigston, shares her experience of supporting young people through the diocesan programme **GROW: Youth Discipleship Ambassadors**.

'Growing Younger', led nationally by Archbishop Stephen, focuses on consultation and engagement with children and young people as an integral part of The Church of England's vision strategy.

**GROW:** Youth Discipleship Ambassadors was created in 2023, as a local diocesan response to the national vision of Growing Younger, enabling young people to grow in faith using the framework of our diocesan Rhythm of Life - prayer, scripture, worship, love, generosity, sharing faith, and rest.

**GROW** recognises this: the importance of enabling and equipping our young people to be active in their faith, to be a voice in the Church which is respected and listened to, and their role in serving the church and community in mission and ministry.

During 2024, pilot groups were held in four locations across the diocese, in Mowbray, Selby, Helmsley and Beverley. As part of this, St Oswald's, Sowerby and All Saints Northallerton

Youth Groups met together. They worked towards nurturing their faith through what it means to live as Christians in church and community, and what happens next.

The young people across all four cohorts gathered for a special service at York Minster on Sunday 16th June, where they were Commissioned as Youth Discipleship Ambassadors during Evensong by Bishop John. This was a really encouraging and exciting event for the young people, as they took their next step on their journey of faith. Young people across Mowbray Deanery then celebrated together with a picnic pilgrimage.

However, the journey doesn't stop here. Each Young Discipleship Ambassador is now working towards their next steps exploring how God is equipping and enabling them in their new role as Ambassadors.

Please pray for them, and that we the Church will welcome and recognise the children and young people in our communities as we seek to 'grow younger', and ask God who in your congregations is he calling to be the next Youth Discipleship Ambassadors.



## A new resource for celebrating creation

The Revd Jan Nobel, Green Ambassador for the Diocese of York, shares a new resource as we begin Creationtide.

Creationtide or the Season of Creation is the period in the annual church calendar, from 1st September to 4th October, dedicated to God as Creator and Sustainer of all life.

Two years ago, two people sat down for a coffee and a chat in the shadow of York Minster. One was the newly appointed Green Ambassador for the Diocese, Revd Johannes Nobel, the other was the freelance writer and licensed lay minister Diane Craven. They talked about worship and creation, and about their shared conviction that 'creation isn't just for Creationtide'. An idea was born: to compile a resource for churches, combining prayer with practical action throughout the liturgical year.

Funding was found through a grant from the Environment Programme. A title transpired: 'Choose Life', based on the challenge from Deuteronomy: 'Therefore, choose life, that you and your offspring may live.' (Deut 30:19) A visual theme emerged: 'Kintsugi', the Japanese art of restoring broken ceramics using precious metals – not hiding the cracks but finding new beauty in brokenness.

As disciples of Christ, we are called to 'choose life': to strive to safeguard the integrity of creation and sustain and renew the life of the Earth'. As members of Christ's body, we are commissioned to heal what has been broken by human sin. Creation waits with eager longing for the children of God to be revealed (Romans 8.19).

Writing and editing 'Choose Life' turned out to take more time than expected. But two years later, the resource has finally fledged! A number of paper copies has been distributed across the diocese – one per benefice – and a free e-book is available to all on the Choose Life website.

Please use this free gift to celebrate creation – now in Creationtide, and throughout the whole year, whenever the opportunity arises.

As Archbishop Stephen writes in the foreword:

"Worship shapes us. May these worship resources enable us to go out with joy as we celebrate the wonders of the world that God has made. Holy, holy, holy is the Lord Almighty; the whole earth is full of his glory." (Isaiah 6.3)

## Raise the roof! St Nicholas, Dunnington, celebrates renovations

Bishop John held a service of thanksgiving for the completed works on the Tower Room roof at St Nicholas, Dunnington.

Originally built in 1988, the Tower Room had slate roof tiles, though these had cracked recently and needed to be replaced to ensure longevity.

The Revd Kath McBride, Rector of the Benefice of Rural East York, said, "The project cost over £110,000 and I would like to start by giving my thanks to all those who donated and helped to find grants to reach the total. The long-term plan is that this was Phase 1 which involved improving the insulation in the roof space, as well as the tiles, and this will help our building to be more energy efficient. Phase 2 of the project will be to replace the heating system with something more sustainable.

"As Bishop John reminded us, the building provides a great place for ministry and mission, but the church is built of living stones – the people of Dunnington who live out their faith and share Christ's story."

She added, "It was a lovely afternoon of celebration with our local community – there were plenty of scones for everyone, and the weather was both warm and dry enough to allow people the opportunity to wander around the churchyard and see the roof from the outside."

Treasurer Helen Pomfret added "The £110,000 seemed like such a large total but we were blessed that £88,000 came from fundraising activities in the village. With some grants from local sources, we were able to reach our target."

The Tower Room is used as a venue for many church events as well as the Community coffee morning, every Saturday at 10.00am, the Dunnington Parish Council meetings, and the Dunnington village art group.

Please pray for the church in Dunnington, for its people, its community and its mission.

Pastoral Letter

A Pastoral Letter from the Bishop of Hull, the Rt Revd Eleanor Sanderson.

The times and seasons of our Cristian tradition calls us into focussed prayer in different ways throughout the year. The time between Ascension and Pentecost is a world-wide call to pray for the unity of the church, for the coming of the Holy Spirit and, more recently, to each pray for five people to know the friendship and lordship of Christ through the Thy Kingdom Come initiative. In Lent, we pray with a focus on humility and repentance. In Advent we pray for, and with, longing for the coming Christ. In the season of Creation, we pray for our natural world and consciously join our voices with the great hymn of creation in praise to God.

Each day is also measured by calls to prayer through the offices of our church. To begin our day in intercession and the confidence that God has come to his people and set us free. To end our day in the companionship of Mary and Simeon and the confidence that the angels of God guard us through the night and quieten the powers of darkness. Each time to pray gives us a gift to know how to pray.

Yet, we are also compelled to pray without ceasing. To let our hearts babble away to God in constant conversation and in calm or wordless quiet. We also commit, through our confirmation commitments, to affirm Christ's authority by praying for our societies and world. As we approached the General Election, we were all invited to Pray our Part, to undergird our nation during that time with concerted prayer.

The call to prayer is such a solid foundation of our church and yet it can be so easy to let the hours and days pass without intentionally making time to pray. I personally find great inspiration from Terresa of Ávila whose practical wisdom is a wonderful combination with her profound encounters with the mystery of God. Her advice on prayer is particularly honest for when we have gone astray or given up, she simply encourages us to just start again.

Jesus shared a parable with the disciples (in Luke 18) that they would keep on praying and not lose heart. Knowing that we are a huge global family praying for one another and for the needs of the world certainly encourages my own heart!

This coming month may you be inspired in prayer and may your prayers bless our church and our world as together we give thanks for God's goodness.

## Sowing, Growing, Nesting with the Mustard Seed Community

**Heather Black, Mustard Seed Programme Leader, shares her reflections on Mustard Seed's growth, and ethos of Sowing, Growing, Nesting.**

The Mustard Seed Community continues to grow, with now over one hundred people who have joined the Stepping Up programme, a year of discipleship and formation for mission. Lay people who take part are drawn from parishes on the edge of our diocese 'where life is tough.' At the end of the year each person is invited to 'step up' in mission, using their gifts and lived experience to develop mission within their local community.

We are inspired by the mustard seed parable, each person like the smallest of seeds is full of potential to grow. We witness the growth and transformation that takes place during the Stepping Up year, people growing in faith and confidence to share the Good News of Jesus in their local community. Each person is involved in 'nest building' using the gifts and resources they find within themselves, their church and community to build spaces where people can feel at home. Each nest is shaped by the local people and place: youth clubs,

community cafes, food pantries, toddler groups, family activities and so much more.

We recently gathered as a Mustard Seed Community at Wydale Hall, with guest speaker Laurence Singlehurst. We had an excellent day exploring this model of mission: 'Sowing, Growing, Nesting'; the journey from first sowing seeds of the gospel to people nesting and finding a home in the family of God. We noticed the importance of listening and being with people on their journey from first contact with the church, that we need to listen to their stories and build relationships of trust, as we journey with them. We need invitations to spaces and events where people can encounter Jesus, good resources to help people discover and understand the gospel, and methods of nurture through alpha or similar groups where people can start their journey of faith.
