Barmby Moor Launches Community Choir

The Barmby Moor Group of churches were ready to launch a three-year plan for growth in September 2023. The plan developed following four months prayerfully discerning God's mission, leading to a vision of 'grow deeper, share with others, flourish together'. Held by the belief that God was encouraging the churches to listen deeply to the needs of the community, when the Revd Mark Poole received a text message from someone in one of the villages saying that a few school mums thought it might be a good idea to form a choir to help with mental health and wellbeing, he realised that God was knocking at the door. A month or two later, the Barmby Community Choir was formed.

The choir is an informal group comprising people from all walks of life. Some members attend church, and many do not. There is no requirement to be able to read music or sing in tune, and there is no expectation that people must attend every week. The desire is to provide some time for the community to come together through the joy of singing and see what happens. The choir has taken off and now has around 20 singers, from those in their 30s to the over-70s. As well as singing a mix of sacred and secular music, friendships have grown and deepened amidst plenty of tea, chat and laughter which sometimes extends to the pub when rehearsals in church are finished!

Members speak enthusiastically of the impact the choir has had on their lives. One member said, "I have somewhere safe to go that has helped me massively to become 'me' again. We all have a laugh and for me the choir is a massive help for when I have bad days, or even months, and now I would be lost without it."

Another choir member added, "I have made new friends and deepened my friendship with others - the choir feels like family! I love that we are all unique and have come together to sing and so much more - laughter, learning, 'feel good', stress relief and fun!"

Since the choir began in the Spring of 2024 it has performed at St Catherine's Church Barmby Moor, including at the 'Big Sing', the carol service and the Live Nativity at the Boot & Slipper pub, introduced by Revd Mark in 2023, which attracts over 200 people. The choir has more performances to look forward to in 2025.

The Revd Mark Poole said, "We hope and pray that the Barmby Moor Community Choir feeds the souls of all its members with God's eternal promise that he came that we may indeed 'have life in all its fullness.'"

Pastoral Letter

A Pastoral Letter from *The Ven Andy Broom, Archdeacon of the East Riding*

Every month has a variety of days marking different events and themes. In January alone you could, if you chose to, celebrate 'Chocolate-Covered Cherry Day' on the 3rd, 'Houseplant Appreciation Day' on the 10th, 'Penguin Day' on the 20th, and 'Answer Your Cat's Questions Day' on the 22nd. The choice is almost overwhelming!

January includes Martin Luther King Day on the 15th. He stands out as one of the greatest champions of justice and equality. His life was dedicated to fighting for equal rights for all, irrespective of their skin colour or ethnic background. He also addressed other issues of inequality in society, especially discrimination against the poorest.

The Christian Faith shaped King's life and ministry. He said of Christ, "Jesus eloquently affirmed from the cross a higher law. He knew that the old eye-for-eye philosophy would leave everyone blind. He did not seek to overcome evil with evil. He overcame evil with good. Although crucified by hate, he responded with aggressive love."

You still find people who prefer an image of Christ that could be summed up by the words 'Gentle Jesus, meek and mild'. Whilst these are aspects of Christ's character, a quick read of the gospels show that those two characteristics are only a small part of his full nature. Often, he exhibited that 'aggressive love' which Martin Luther King speaks of – whilst its radicalness upset some, it also transformed the lives of many.

Issues of inequality remain, and God's Church is called upon to both highlight, and to fight, injustice. Martin Luther King followed his Saviour in rejecting an indifferent or passive response to injustice – loving aggressively doesn't allow for it. As Martin Luther King said "Our lives begin to end, the day we become silent about things that matter."

Connect Service Celebrates Children with Additional Needs

The Revd Mairi Taylor-Gibson, Distinctive Deacon at Holy Redeemer Acomb, speaks about the ministry of Connect, a service reaching children with additional needs.

Connect was started last December as a response to our awareness of a large number of local families of children with additional needs. We were also blessed to have connections to Christians whose work or family life gave them experience which enabled us to cater for children with physical and neurodiverse needs; offering a supportive and welcoming way to hear about God.

We meet on the fourth Sunday of each month at 3pm in Holy Redeemer, Boroughbridge Road in Acomb, York. The session starts with activities such as play-doh, crafts, biscuit decorating and toys with refreshments available. After about half an hour, we invite everyone to join together (although if they don't want to there is no pressure, children are free to continue their activities) and sing our welcome song, followed by listening to a Bible story. We then have a time of group games such as using a parachute or finding things in church followed by a closing song and bubble prayers.

All our songs and stories are accompanied with Makaton signing and our activities have Makaton labels on them to aid communication. We are also blessed with a large open, flat church building which allows wheelchair and walker access. Our children have really enjoyed the freedom to explore church and the story in their own way and parents have valued the opportunity to relax and meet other parents in a similar position.

Connect is designed as a service for people to use either as an opportunity to explore faith with their families or to complement their existing church life in their own settings. Please pray for our families that they will find the love and peace of God in their time at Connect and for the team as we seek to plan and invite more people to hear God's message and see his love for their whole families.

New Worshipping Community where deaf and hearing people gather

'Harmony' is a new worshipping community based at St Mary's Church, Boston Spa which brings together deaf, hearing impaired and hearing people to eat and worship together. Harmony runs on the second Sunday of each month starting at 12.30pm with a light lunch (usually soup then cake) and lasts around two hours.

The congregation uses a blend of communication styles, combining BSL, lip reading, speech, and live transcription software. While this makes things move quite slowly, it means that everyone is able to contribute to the Bible discussion and prayer sharing times. One unexpected outcome of the way the worship is led is that a couple of people who have dementia attend and find this slower pace of things suits them, even though they are more at home with traditional liturgy.

The group started meeting in July following discussions between the Revd Nick Morgan, vicar of St Mary's, and Christine Shaw who is also part of the team at 'Connections' café church, part of St Mary's Multiply project. Christine is deaf, and her vision was for deaf and hearing people to eat and worship together. For Christine, it was crucial that, while the worshipping community would grow out of deaf people's culture, this was not to be a group solely for deaf people – hearing people were very much part of the vision.

Nick says, "To paraphrase Galatians 3.28, in Christ there is no deaf or hearing, for all of us are one in Christ Jesus!"

"As a hearing person I think of the word 'harmony' as all about sound, so it isn't a word I would ever have come up with for a group co-led by deaf people, but for Christine it was the obvious word: people who have different cultures of communication working in harmony to create a way of worshipping led by deaf culture, but inclusive of those who hear.

"I, and others who are not deaf, are the ones for whom reasonable adjustments are being made at Harmony so we can participate. It is an eye opener as one of the worship leaders to be the one who is on the steep learning curve – and I do get heckled a lot in BSL!"

Eco Community Space Grows at Ingleby Barwick

Maia Forrester (pictured above), eco champion at St Francis' Church Ingleby Barwick, shares how the church have developed their carpark into an eco community space.

As one of the eco champions at St. Francis of Assisi, I became aware of a potential space in our carpark we could develop. I was looking at our ground boundary and realised there was about 5 metres deep of scrub bush, just totally dead and invading the area.

We formed a weekly gardening group to clear out this area and expand our idea of a dead hedge, prayer walk and labyrinth, children's outdoor activities, including brass rubbings, as well as recycled pallet seating area that could be used for prayer,

contemplation and time in God's creation. It has taken us a full year from the first session to a full 24-metre section of dead hedge. Using the dead bushes and bushes from traffic island re-ordering has meant there is zero waste from our works and no trees had to be removed, which was amazing!

As I write today, we now have people using the area, most popular with our younger ones to explore. It has enabled us to achieve the Silver Eco Church Award and to implement habitats for a wide range of species. It is dotted with bird, bat, hedgehog and bee boxes, as well as minibeast hotels and newly nesting birds.

Part of our overall mission is to make it an area that both public and congregation can enjoy, in harmony with our biodiverse ecosystem. We are getting a portacabin installed, hopefully next year, so it can be used for planting, praying, and enjoying the outdoors, providing space for schools and social action projects.

Many have stopped for a cuppa and chat or joined us for soup lunch, appreciating the fellowship. The cafe has not in any way been a fundraising initiative, but it's surprising and humbling how generously people respond to something offered for free!

Pastoral Letter



A Pastoral Letter from The Ven Sam Rushton, Archdeacon of York

In these days of Lent, our walk through 'the wilderness' continues. Wilderness is a recurrent theme in the Bible. Whether as a community – like the people of Israel fleeing their Egyptian slavery – or as individuals, many find themselves in those places where all that they had relied upon or taken for granted is stripped away and they are left to fend for themselves in an empty place. And in those places of deep alone-ness, they find God, the God who went before them into that dark and empty space and inhabited it with himself.

We are not alone. This is the great triumphant shout of our Christian hope. We are not alone. Our God goes with us. The Son of Man came to share our sorrows, our joys, our burdens. The Holy Spirit binds us together in love. We are not alone and we do not need to be afraid.

The period of wilderness feels like a little death, a stripping away of physical reality so that all that is left is just me and what I carry with me. It is a place where I come face-to-face with who I am when all the 'stuff' that I thought was important no longer is. When I look back to the world I left behind, I realise most of it was easier to let go of than I thought and I mourn the wasted time, the people I could have spent more time with. And I hope and I pray for the time yet to come, when the journey through the wilderness is over.

But if the gospels teach us anything, it is that the resurrection body is not the same as the body that died. New life is not the same as the old life with a second wind. My prayer for the Church is that it will allow itself to be changed by its prolonged journey through the wilderness this year.

Reflection on Racial Justice Sunday

Gerald Fox, Diocesan Racial Justice Education Adviser, reflects as the Church marks Racial Justice Sunday.

2025 will mark thirty years since the first Racial Justice Sunday and so provides us with a chance to reflect on how well we have done in combatting racism over the last thirty years.

In 2021 the Archbishops' Antiracism Task Force published *From Lament to Action*. Its sobering conclusion was that the Church of England was institutionally racist and had failed to take any significant action despite twenty-five previous reports. Since then, however, there have been some encouraging signs. In our own diocese we have seen the setting up of the Racial Justice Advocates Group, the creation of a Racial Justice Charter, the appointment of a Racial Justice Education Advisor and Archbishop Stephen welcomed UKME/GMH clergy from across the Northern Province to Bishophorpe Palace. This year it would be good to see more parishes marking Racial Justice Sunday by utilising some of the excellent resources that are available.

Racial Justice Sunday is about remembering, reflecting and responding. We should remember why racial justice is important. The bible doesn't have a lot to say about racial

justice because racism as an idea is a product of the transatlantic slave trade and colonialism. However, the bible does have a lot to say about the importance of justice. 'But let justice roll down like waters' (Amos 5.24). We should love and pursue justice because God does. Justice is part of who God is. As a church we should reflect God's nature and work to make our churches places where everybody is not only welcomed but affirmed.

Racial Justice Sunday also calls us to reflect on human diversity and thank God for it. The amazing variety of God's creation and everything in it, including people, demonstrate His love of diversity. Each and everyone of us is fearfully and wonderfully made (Psalm 139.14) and we are all made in God's image (Gen 1.26). We are gifted by God with unique talents, skills and perspectives and it is only by ensuring everybody can put those gifts to use in God's service that our church can thrive and grow.

Finally, Racial Justice Sunday calls us to respond by working to end racism through prayer and action. What action we take will look differently for each of us depending on our contexts, but we can all pray for the work of racial justice in our diocese and make a conscious effort to educate ourselves about issues of race and racism in our church and the wider world.

New Bishops' Adviser for Women's Ministry

The Revd Dianne Gamble has been appointed as the Bishops' Adviser for Women's Ministry. Following a career in the Railway Industry, Dianne was ordained as a priest in 2016, and currently serves as the Priest in Charge of five benefices in Mowbray Deanery.

Reflecting on her appointment, Dianne writes:

Thirty years ago, I was present in York Minster when the first women in this diocese were ordained priests. It was a moment of support to, and celebration for, the ministry of one of those being priested who was a friend. Over time I have got to know some of those other women who became priests that day. Receiving their priestly ministry has been a great blessing to me. Eight years ago, it was my turn to accept God's call and become a priest in the Church of God.

Thirty years has seen more women responding to God's call on them to serve in the church, in both ordained and lay roles. More and more people have experienced the ministry of women and been blessed by that ministry. But it isn't always easy. Women in ministry bring a variety of experiences into that ministry. There will be times and situations when these experiences will be very different to what men

bring into ministry. We live in a society where unconscious bias sets expectation of what women can be and what they can achieve. For the church to support women in ministry, it needs to hear about the challenges that they face so that appropriate support can be offered. As the new Bishops Advisor for Women's Ministry, my role will be to listen to my colleagues and share with our bishops the reality of ministry as women and also to support that ministry and encourage and equip women in our churches to have the courage to respond to God's call on them.

Commenting on Dianne's appointment, Stephen Cottrell, the Archbishop of York, said, "I'm thrilled that Dianne will be joining us as our Adviser for Women's Ministry. Dianne brings a wealth of experience and wisdom to this much-needed role, and I look forward to working with her in our shared commitment for women to flourish in the ministries God has called them to."

Please pray for Dianne as she settles into her new role, and for all women who serve in all forms of ministry across this diocese.

Pastoral Letter

A Pastoral Letter from The Rt Revd Barry Hill, Bishop of Whitby

Dear sisters and brothers in Christ,

How and why we grow younger and more diverse as a Church is at the heart of Living Christ's Story (and part of the diocesan-wide brief which, with colleagues, I hold). 'Younger and more diverse' obviously covers a very wide range of different forms of diversity, with it being important to honour the stories, opportunities and challenges unique to each, but they are deliberately held together because a common question is at their heart: how do we nurture a Church in which we don't put ourselves, our stories, experiences and perspectives at the centre and define everything and everyone else by what we have known?

The scriptures show us that diversity (for example, in Acts 17 racial diversity) is not first a problem to solve, but God's gift to the Church so that each person can see the difference Jesus Christ makes in their context and story. We seek to grow younger, not so we feel better about ourselves or have a slightly more secure future for the Church, but because the Gospel of Jesus Christ helps address so many of the challenges Gen Z and Gen Alpha are carrying, and because as a Church we need the experiences and wisdom of young people.

This week, as in our prayer diary we especially pray for Teesside University, please pray for a major piece of work starting next month to discern how best we serve, support and reach both Higher and Further Education students (post-18) across our diocese. There are more details on the diocesan website of how those already involved in mission and ministry with post-18 students can be involved. We can all join together in prayer as university and college students face issues as never before, that the grace and blessings of God would move contagiously through the education communities of North Yorkshire.

The Revd Dr Jenny Wright reflects as we begin our journey of Lent.

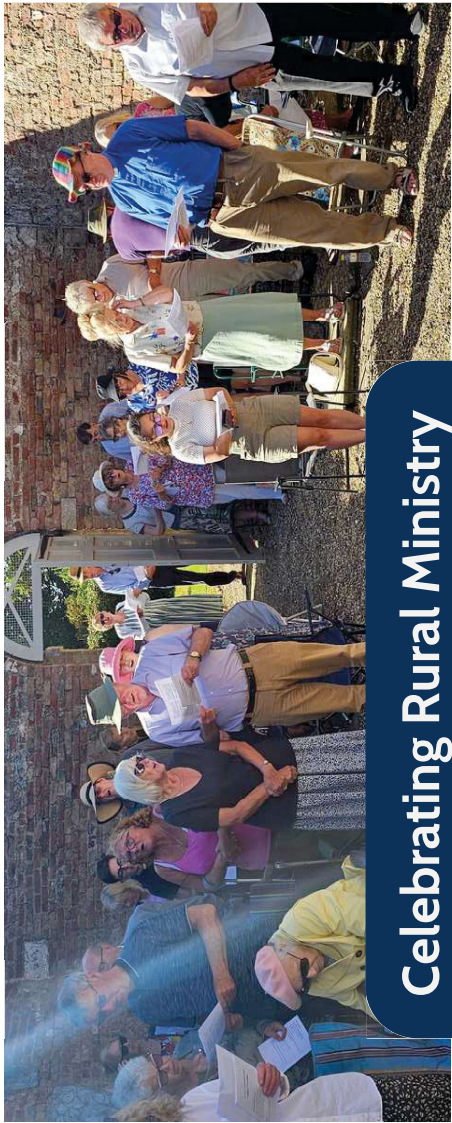
As winter slowly turns to spring and the first snowdrops peak through the frozen ground as a sign of life and hope, so in the church calendar we begin to prepare ourselves for the great feast of Easter by entering the season of Lent, taking time to allow God to inhabit our thoughts and our hearts. For it is then that we encounter the hope that we have in Christ, sure in the knowledge that we are God's chosen elect, that we are redeemed by Christ's blood, that the darkness will not overcome the light.

Celebrating Rural Ministry in North Holderness

The Revd David Messer, Area Dean of North Holderness, celebrates rural ministry across the deanery.

It is an honour to serve in North Holderness Deanery. We are a deanery made up of five benefices, with a mixture of rural and coastal villages and one seaside town. We stretch from Beeford to Leven, to Skirlaugh and on to Aldborough and Hornsea.

There are twenty-two villages, each with its place of worship, with a mix of traditional and contemporary worship. Locally, the churches provide places of worship and pastoral support, study and development, and places of warmth and celebration. Like so many deaneries, we have been focussed on developing our Deanery Plan, aligned with the diocesan vision of Living Christ's Story.

In amongst of all of this work we sometimes just need to stop and celebrate our lives together, worship and give thanks for our relationship with Christ and God's beautiful creation that surrounds us.

In August each year, we gather in the former Benedictine Priory of Nunkeeling, hidden away in rural Holderness - a nunnery founded in 1152 by Agnes de Arches, in honour of St. Mary Magdalene. Over the years in this abandoned priory church, the benefice has held an open air gathering of worship.

In 2022, we used the priory as a place we could gather as a deanery. We encouraged one another to stop for an afternoon, take some space from being busy, and relax into a place where the walls are soaked in the prayers of those who have gone before us. It was such a fruitful time to be together, to see the sky and feel a wonderful summer breeze come through unglazed windows.

We bless you, master of the heavens, for the wonderful order and beauty which enfolds this world; bless the ministry in all those places of rural life, that we may be partakers in your continuing recreation of this earth, and, with joy, join in creation's endless song of praise.
