LIVING *holiness*

Living Holiness in York Deanery

The Revd Canon Richard Carew, Associate Area Dean in York and Vicar of the Benefice of Dringhouses, shares how churches across the deanery came together to journey through 'Living Holiness' during Lent.

During Covid we learnt that we don't have to be physically in the same place to be able to do things together. In the Deanery of York we have taken that principle and applied it to our Lent Courses.

York is one of the larger deaneries in the diocese when it comes to the number of different churches involved, and sometimes it can be a bit of a challenge to feel like the Body of Christ acting together. This year each parish has therefore been invited to use the diocesan resource 'Living Holiness' as a Lent Course and to advertise across the deanery the different times at which each church would be holding the course so that whatever church people usually attend, they might be able to find a day and time to suit them – and maybe even get to venture beyond the parish boundaries.

'Living Holiness' encourages us to reflect on our relationship with God, but also with others, and how we might better live out the commandment to love one another.

Sharing our Lent Courses is only a small step in terms of getting to know each other better, but we do pray that when we come to our Easter celebrations, we will have been encouraged by stories of God at work across this deanery, that we will each have had a fresh glimpse of God made visible in Jesus, and that we might have picked up a few ideas from each other along the way.

Over 100 pilgrims gather to explore the Lord's Prayer

As part of the Faith in the North programme, Archbishop Stephen is touring across the north of England teaching about the Lord's Prayer, offering a chance to reconnect with its timeless words and consider how they can change our lives, our communities, and the wider world.

Connecting with this tour, Bishop Barry Hill and Archdeacon Amanda Bloor lead a group of pilgrims on the new St Aelred's Pilgrim Trail in March, reflecting on lines of the Lord's Prayer throughout the day. The trail, launched last September was bathed in sunshine and temperatures of 15 degrees. Nearly 100 pilgrims gathered at the beginning of the 8 mile route, sharing in a welcome and opening prayer in the parish church at Old Byland.

During the day, the group of pilgrims grew at each stopping point. The group paused at the churches of Scawton, Cold Kirby, 'and the Methodist and Parish churches at Rievaulx'. At each of these, a short reflection was offered on a section of the Lord's Prayer, exploring what it might mean for us today. The group of pilgrims welcomed more walkers and horse riders at each village, and towards the end of the day the group reached over 150. The final part of the afternoon saw the pilgrim group process from the parish church to Rievaulx Abbey, gathering for a service bathed in sunshine. It was a fitting end to a day

of walking, faith, friendship, and Christian witness that will linger long in the memory.

Bishop Barry reflected, "It was a great joy to spend the day walking and praying with people from across the region on this wonderful new pilgrimage route which I heartily commend to you. We were particularly reminded of St Augustine's words that, 'it is solved by walking', that in the Christian life we can't work out everything and then live it out; it is in the living that the rendering happens."

The Revd Mel Burnside, Priest in Charge of Helmsley and Upper Ryedale, said, "It's just been wonderful - sunshine and joy and love all day!"

George Gyte, a member of the St Aelred's Pilgrim Trail team added, "It was a heart lifting day of faith, hope, and joy. A day of sunshine, wonderful countryside to walk through, inspiring and reflective prayer stages, and a poignant service led by Bishop Barry amidst the grandeur of Rievaulx Abbey's Nave. This Lent Walk will live long in the memory, as will the hauntingly beautiful sounds of the Bilsdale Silver Band accompanied by bold hymn singing voices."

Pastoral Letter



A Pastoral Letter from The Rt Rev'd Dr Flora Winfield, Bishop of Selby.

Many of us will have taken the opportunity to give something up (or take up a positive new habit) during Lent. For lots of people, this might mean giving up something they love to eat or drink, and the tradition of fasting in Lent is an important habit which can help us to find new focus, and new joy when we celebrate the Easter feast.

What really matters to you? What are the guiding values of your life? If a good friend, someone who you like and trust, described you to someone else, how would they see your priorities and values, and your instincts for kindness and goodness? Lent can offer all of us the opportunity to take a look in that spiritual mirror.

In the Easter story, following Jesus' humiliation and cruel death by crucifixion, the women who were among his disciples went to visit his tomb, very early in the morning on the day we now mark as Easter Sunday. In the darkness before dawn, when everything that they had hoped for seemed lost, these brave women went to prepare Jesus's body for burial.

And in the darkness of that first Easter morning, they saw for themselves the truth that new life is possible in Jesus, that God's love for us is boundless, breaking the barriers of time and space and even the bonds of death, and that in our messy, imperfect world, Jesus Christ invites us on Easter Day and every day to find hope in him.

And the Easter hope is infinite: as we share hope in Jesus with others, our own hope is strengthened. Even when we feel most uncertain about the future, hope in Jesus Christ makes new life possible, as we live his story together.

Earlier in the spring, the Revd David Porter signed off after sixty years of service.

A celebration in February took place in Haxby, where David has held PTO since his retirement, marking the conclusion of his sixty years of active ministry. David was ordained Deacon on 24 May 1964 and Priest on 13 June 1965, and offering most of his ministry during that time to churches across the Diocese of York.

Reflecting on his decades of ministry, David writes, "It all began on a wet weekend in Shropshire when my wife Gillian and I went to look at the parish of Clun. This was a group of seven churches with the Vicar and three curates working together. I trained at Ely Theological College, which like many Cathedral Colleges, helped us to establish a rhythm of life, similar to the diocesan Rhythm of Life framework.

"Rooted in prayer, the Clergy Team met together six days a week for Morning and Evening Prayer, and the Eucharist. I find that I am closer to God in worship than anywhere else. We moved to the Diocese of York, and worship was transformed during my curacies in Scarborough and Fulford. The services were changing dramatically from the 1662 Book of Common Prayer to more modern language with greater flexibility.

"I first became a Vicar in Strensall where people lived generously and opened their hearts and minds to God. As Vicar of Easingwold, I found the people of the Deanery of Easingwold were great at loving one another. The churches did so much together. As Rector of All Saints, Pavement in York city centre, I was able to share faith with so many – as Chaplain to seventeen organisations including Guilds and military veterans. I find the Bible comes alive through Morning and Evening Prayer each day, and helps me to be shaped by scripture. Much of my ministry has been marked by restoring churches which are a sacrament of God's presence in the community.

"In retirement, Gillian and I have eased ourselves into St Mary's Church, Haxby across the last twenty years, as part of our patterns of rest. It's been a privilege to mark my final years of active ministry here."

The Revd Kathryn Jackson, Rector of Haxby and Wigginton, comments, "I invited David to celebrate Holy Communion for the last time at St Mary's Church, and we celebrated his years of ministry with a party afterwards. It was a joyful occasion, and it's been an honour to share in ministry with David for so many years."

Worship Working Group to create new video and podcast series

The Worship Working Group, established last year, are set to create a new video and podcast series.

The group, which includes members from across the diocese, focus on the diocesan priority of 'Becoming More Like Christ', with particular attention to how our worship forms us in faith, and enables us to be transformed through our encounters with God. The group seeks to enable leaders to catch a vision of culture change towards missional worship, resourcing the breadth of the Church of England in how it can be enriched, through exploring creativity and improving knowledge in a way that offers freedom.

After research on where needs are across the diocese, the Worship Working Group has begun to plan a resourcing programme, taking the form of a video and podcast series. The series will cover a range of topics, including what worship is and why it matters, accessibility in worship, why we sing, and how we offer seasonal worship well. Each episode will be conversational between members of the group, with guest contributors invited for particular subjects. This will include exploring fresh perspectives on worship such as fresh expressions, alternative creative worship, and

using digital platforms. Each video conversation will also be offered as a podcast, offering different opportunities for people to engage with its content.

The collection of videos and podcasts will aim to equip, inspire and enable reflection on worship practice across our diocesan family of churches and beyond.

Commenting on the project, Sammi Tooze who Chairs the group writes, "Having been encouraged to re-establish a diocesan group focusing on resourcing worship by the national Liturgical Commission, it is wonderful to see the group putting roots down with this exciting project. I'm really looking forward to hearing the shared wisdom that many will offer, and in seeing the positive impact it will have for our diocese."

Reflection on Vocations Sunday

The Revd Anna Burr, who leads the team of Diocesan Vocations Advisers, reflects on Vocations Sunday taking place on 11th May 2025.

‘We all wander far from God and lose our way: Christ comes to find us and welcomes us home. In baptism we respond to his call.’

These words, from the service of Baptism, are a reminder that everyone who has been baptised is also called by God to follow Jesus. Baptism can be the beginning of a journey of discovery of all that God has in store for our lives. I wonder where that journey has taken you. How have you responded to his call?

Discovering what God’s particular call to each of us might be isn’t always straightforward. We might have very fixed ideas of what a ‘calling’ looks like: maybe to be a doctor, a teacher and priest or even a missionary or, maybe more scarily, a monk or nun. God’s call is never the same, but we know that he calls us each by name and longs to equip and to bless us as we flourish in his service.

Across the Church of England, we believe all are called to serve God according to their given

gifts, talents and context. Every Christian has a vocation, and it is the task of all those serving in ministry to help identify and nurture the gifts and callings of every member of the Church.

The diocesan team of Vocations Advisers is on hand to help. We are a small team who love to work with people who sense God is calling them to something new. Together with those who notice God is doing something new through people in their church, we listen, pray and explore the many opportunities for ministry.

Why not start your journey of exploration by having a chat with someone you trust – your parish priest would be a good start! After all – Jesus calls all who have been baptised to follow him as his disciples. Where might he want you to follow him?

*A Pastoral Letter from The Most Revd and Rt Hon Stephen Cottrell
Archbishop of York*



As we find ourselves in the Easter season, eagerly awaiting Pentecost, I wonder what we can learn from the first disciples (unaware of what will soon happen), and their unbridled joy and enthusiasm at having their beloved Teacher back among them?

Perhaps there is a lesson here about spending time with God. By studying scripture and praying faithfully, we get to know the heart and mind of God.

This teaches us how to live and be in the church and in the world. As we strive to become more like Christ, we need to allow ourselves to be shaped by God rather than the world.

There is so much anger in the world (some righteous, much that isn't). There is so much pain in the world, so much suffering and sorrow. So often, we see things from one perspective, and there is a lack of kindness, generosity and hospitality in what we see in others. So we need to learn to see things differently, to sing a different song.

We mustn't be like those people who have eyes but do not see and ears but do not hear. No. Let us commit ourselves this Easter, sure in the hope of the resurrection, to see and hear, to do kindness and mercy, to love justice, to walk humbly with our God.

Let us go out of our way to care for others and to reach out to those in need.

Let us pray without ceasing.

Let us live as an Easter people, all parts of Christ's body working together to make God known in this world. Let us live as a people of love!

As Acting Archdeacon, alongside Bishop of Selby the Rt Revd Dr Flora Winfield, her responsibilities within the Archdeaconry of York (the City and Vale of York, and from the western edge of the Wolds to the far side of Selby) will include overseeing church property, supporting clergy, and ensuring that proper and legal procedures are followed

within deaneries and parishes, and for appointments.

Bishop Flora said, "I'm so grateful that Liz Hassall has agreed to Act as Archdeacon of York, to work with me and with the team of Area and Lay Deans to care for the communities and churches of the archdeaconry. Liz is a highly capable and experienced priest, and a very approachable and pastoral colleague, and I look forward very much to working with her in this role.

"I'm grateful too to the York City Centre churches for lending her to us – and I know we will all be holding Liz in our prayers for these responsibilities."

Cherry Burton Church celebrates Open Door Community Café

The Revd Richard Parkinson, Rector at Cherry Burton and Area Dean of Beverley, shares the success of a parish church Community Café.

Ministry is challenging, rewarding, and diverse in all our Mission Units and this is true amongst our rural churches where they are one of only two or three places for community gathering. Our communities not only provide a space to gather for worship and prayer, but beyond that create welcoming events and initiatives for the lonely, the isolated, the aging, and the young.

Whilst the size of our village communities means that we struggle to be able to build a 'critical mass' of any single demographic this does provide the opportunity for inter-generational community to flourish. About seven years ago, St Michael's Cherry Burton set-up the Open Door Community Café using seed funding from the PCC. Now the café has repaid the PCC its seed funding and is a thriving weekly space used by a wide range of people including the elderly, young families, children with their teachers from Cherry Burton primary school, walkers, cyclists, knitters, and even the local PCSOs pop in occasionally. The Open Door Community Café is now wholly run and maintained by volunteers who bake cakes and cook soups from home, as well as those who serve customers and wash-up each week.

This has brought our regular worshippers and many non-church attendees together under a vision of 'loving your neighbour as you love yourself'. It is creating and solidifying relationships, promoting faith in action, as well as raising money from the café's proceeds to support local, national, and international charities. In the past 12 months they have donated £5,000 to Dove House Hospice, as well as topping up the local St Michael's Hardship Fund that supports emergency needs in the local villages and amongst partner parishes in Hull. This does not stand alone but is one part of the multitude of other ways the worshipping community is interwoven with village life. They are living their discipleship out in the open and sharing Christ's story through their words, and actions.

This is only one example of the hundreds of coffee mornings, crafts groups, bible study groups, choirs, prayer meetings, and building committees that are the day-to-day of a village church. Each connection brings the opportunity to live the reality of Christ amongst our neighbours who know us and whom we know well. The only big numbers we are likely to see in rural ministry are the heating and insurance bills but our rural churches are an open door for all our local residents to find God right where they live.

“Having spent 17 years as a small school Headteacher and the last ten of these as a leader of one of our diocesan schools, the decision to apply for the role as Diocesan Director of Education was in one way incredibly simple. Having seen the powerful force for good that the Diocesan Education Team had been for our school and the surrounding cluster, to be a part of this and have the opportunity to support others was an amazing prospect for me personally, but I also had big shoes to fill!

“However, the decision to leave my role at school was not as easy. I had spent 10 years working in, and doing my best to support, the community in which I live. In addition, I had been a director of one of the EEF's Research Schools, whose mission is to close the educational outcome gaps for the most

deprived and vulnerable. Not only did I feel I could make a difference to others, it was also a rewarding experience for me.

“As a consequence, as I move into my new role, I would love to bring this passion for making education the best it can be for all to my role leading the Education Team – by supporting all those who are serving our students and helping them, in turn, to contribute to our communities. This may be clearly visible disadvantage as well as more subtle vulnerabilities.

“We begin this work with our summer conference looking at ‘Doing Difficult’ with Andrew Read, and I certainly don't underestimate the complexities involved with this role and the challenges I have set for myself. The prayers of the diocesan community as we strive to succeed in the task we have set for ourselves would be greatly appreciated, as well as remembering all those who are working on the ground on a daily basis doing their absolute best to enhance the life chances of our amazing pupils.”

Pastoral Letter

A Pastoral Letter from The Very Revd Dominic Barrington Dean of York



In the coming weeks, York Minster will be privileged to host the annual ordination of deacons. At the high point of the liturgy, Archbishop Stephen will pray for the sending down of the Holy Spirit on these women and men, and a new chapter will begin in the lives of this particular group of disciples. At much the same time, new beginnings will occur for those being ordained to the priesthood by the other bishops of our diocese, in a variety of services in local parish churches. And in June Archbishop Stephen will also ordain a new bishop to serve in this northern province of the Church of England.

At all these services, families, friends, and many from the wider church will be cheering on these deacons as they move into this new sphere of their lives. I hope that we will all feel called to celebrate these newest members of clergy... and I hope that we will do so for more than one reason.

For the truth is, that in these various liturgies of ordination, we do not only rejoice with and because of those called to these specific ministries. Ordained Women Gather in Cleveland Archdeaconry

Thirty ordained women in licensed posts across the Archdeaconry of Cleveland (from the Tees southwards to Ryedale and the A1 eastwards to Whitby) gathered for an afternoon recently with Bishop of Whitby, Barry Hill.

Led jointly by Bishop Barry, Archdeacon of Cleveland Amanda Bloor and the Bishops' Adviser for Women's Ministry Dianne Gamble, the group enjoyed fellowship over afternoon tea and spent time praying together.

"We shared with one another how ordained ministry feels at the moment, the kind of Church we hope to see in the years to come and what we can best do across the diocese to help us get there," said Bishop Barry.

He added, "It was good to spend time reflecting candidly together about the pain of gender inequality as well as the joys of ministry, and to have opportunity to express again how hugely grateful to God I am for the wonderful ordained women of the archdeaconry."

The group heard from new Archbishop's Advisor for Pastoral Care Mo Theodosius, and from research into maternity policy and ordained women from working class contexts – both being led by people from the archdeaconry.

"It was good to be with fellow ordained women and to share thoughts about ministry," said Archdeacon Amanda. "One woman had been in the first tranche ordained as priest in 1994 whilst others were new curates in training; all affirmed God's calling and their desire to serve the Church in this Diocese.

"We laughed together, ate excellent cake (thanks, Pep!) and looked to the future. Thanks go to Bishop Barry for arranging the afternoon and to all those who attended."

Praying for the Whole People of God

In our Prayer Diary, we pray each day for churches, schools and other communities across our diocese. When we do this, we pray for the whole people of God in that place - all those who lead and serve, those who worship, and those in the wider community.

Diocesan South African Link

The Diocese of York is twinned with three Dioceses in South Africa - Cape Town, False Bay and Saldanha Bay. The Diocese of Saldanha Bay is linked with the Archdeaconry of York, False Bay with the Archdeaconry of Cleveland, and the Diocese of Cape Town with the Archdeaconry of East Riding. The purpose of the link is to encourage one another, in a mutual concern to help each other in our mission to make Christ's love known. We are committing to pray for communities in South Africa each week in our Diocesan Prayer Diary.

Porvoo Communion

The Porvoo Communion is a communion of 15 Anglican and Evangelical Lutheran churches in Europe. The communion was established in 1992 by a theological agreement entitled the Porvoo Common Statement which establishes full communion between and among these churches. The Porvoo Declaration commits the churches which have signed it 'to share a common life' and 'to pray for and with one another'. An important way of doing this is to pray through the year for the Porvoo churches and their Dioceses.

The Anglican Communion is a family of 42 autonomous and independent-yet-interdependent national, pan-national and regional churches in communion with the see of Canterbury. Through the Anglican Cycle of Prayer, Anglicans around the world have been united in praying on the same day for the same dioceses. Day by day, Monday to Saturday, we join in prayer for particular dioceses. And on Sundays, we pray mainly for provinces - and occasionally for other specific prayer biddings.
