Children's Ministry at St Olave's

Clare Steele-King reflects on children's ministry at St Olave's Church, York.

When my husband and I first arrived at St Olave's Church, Marygate, York in 1999, I was pregnant with our first child, and we were welcomed into a church where children had their own young church activities during the Sunday Eucharist, as well as a few other events during the year. The number of children was large enough for vibrant activity sessions with crafts and music, but small enough that the children were fully integrated into the St Olave's family, and nurtured by the rest of the congregation. St Olave's is a special place for such cross-generational friendships, rooted in a love of God, and we still credit the positive impact of that on our own now grown-up family.

As children graduated from the young church activities, they would often segue into ministries in the church, perhaps as servers or choristers. Today, we are blessed to still have a strong serving team as well as a wonderfully accomplished choir, which includes many of our younger members and continues to be a means of outreach at St Olave's. In contrast, our young church, already depleted in number because of a changing demographic, failed to survive the lockdowns of the pandemic and didn't return.

However, church communities are rarely static, and now, in 2025, we have three young children in our congregation and last autumn we gently relaunched our young church. Our "Roots Group" offers activities on the first and third Sundays of the month as part of the Sunday Eucharist. Sometimes we have one child attending, often two, once we had all three, but the number is less significant than the fun that is had and the time with God that is shared.

On Maundy Thursday, we hosted an Easter Crafts morning that was open to all primary school age children within the parish and beyond. On first thought, perhaps three children attending might not be considered a roaring success, but three children enjoying the church space and interacting positively with the Easter story through crafts and marshmallow-sheep biscuits is, I believe, a blessed starting point from which to grow.

Gracious God,
we give thanks for all ministry with children across the Diocese of York, and for all children in their creativity and sense of enquiry.
Give us strength to encourage, that their imaginations might be opened wide through faith in you, joyfully being the Church of today.

Celebrating Eco Church Gold for Aislaby

A rare Eco Church Gold Award has been won by St Margaret's Church, Aislaby (near Whitby) in recognition of the parish's efforts to care for God's earth.

Eco Church is a learning community of churches, run by A Rocha UK, a Christian charity working to protect and restore the natural world and committed to equipping Christians and churches in the UK to care for the environment. St Margaret's is at the edge of the North York Moors National Park and the churchyard is a haven for wildlife and a place where people can find peace and quiet.

Churches working towards the three levels of Eco Church award – bronze, silver and gold, complete an online survey to see which award level they can achieve. The idea is to complete actions in order to achieve the points necessary for an initial award, followed by further actions to achieve the next one.

In June last year A Rocha announced the fiftieth Eco Church Gold Award in England and Wales, so St Margaret's award remains a rare and coveted prize.

Jane Macfarlane of St Margaret's Eco-church Team explains, "We believe we are the first church in the Diocese of York to achieve the Gold Eco Church Award and are very excited about it.

"As well as looking after the land, the church cares for the other aspects of the award criteria: Worship, Management of Buildings, Community and Global Engagement and Lifestyle.

"We are Carbon Neutral by offsetting our carbon footprint in donations to Climate Stewards, but we aim to make this a reality in the future."

Bishop of Whitby Barry Hill has congratulated St Margaret's on their achievement: "I know from experience how much hard work and vision it takes to reach such a milestone. I appreciate you haven't worked towards a Gold Award in order to achieve a plaque as the ultimate goal, but rather it comes in recognition of your Christian commitment to know and show how God's wonder and awe is writ large through all God has made and nurtured. '...and it was good!'"

The Diocese of York is twinned with three Dioceses in South Africa - Cape Town, False Bay and Saldanha Bay. Pastoral Letter

A Pastoral Letter from The Rt Rev'd Barry Hill, Bishop of Whitby.

'There is a time for everything' writes the author of Ecclesiastes. Humans are designed for rhythm: breathing, the thud-thud of our hearts, day and night, seasons, sabbath and the church's year. Most of us live by rhythm and often it is when we depart from rhythms and their related habits that life can come off the rails.

'What is the good news of God for those I spend time with?' is an important question for to regularly consider. There are many answers (identity, life, freedom, joy, purpose, forgiveness, hope, love, salvation...) but, in a society often consumed by a 'more, bigger, faster' philosophy, living Christ's story brings the offer of a healthier rhythm to life. In a world beset by overwork and stress, the gift of a wider perspective than the next deadline and an identity not first about we do, but what God has done for us, is good news to know and point others to.

As summer may bring a more rest for some of us, it might be helpful to see rest as a simple 2 by 2 grid, with passive and active rest on one axis and low octane and high octane on the other. Exhaustion can push us to passive, low octane rest, the kind of numbing that can watch hours of Netflix or have a drink or two too many. Sometimes this can flip to the sugar, caffeine or cortisol spikes of the active low octane.

Both of these boxes can have their place, but if they become the only or normative rest it is unlikely we will know the kind of sabbath for which we're made. I wonder we are called to chose what, at first, can be harder and find restoration more purposefully, the path that leads to rest being the fuel for life, rather than the escape from too work? As Christians rest has at its heart a restoration with the people God has made us and saved us to be - a postcard of the ultimate sabbath. Whatever rest is possible for you, I pray you may know glimpses of the rest for which we are made.

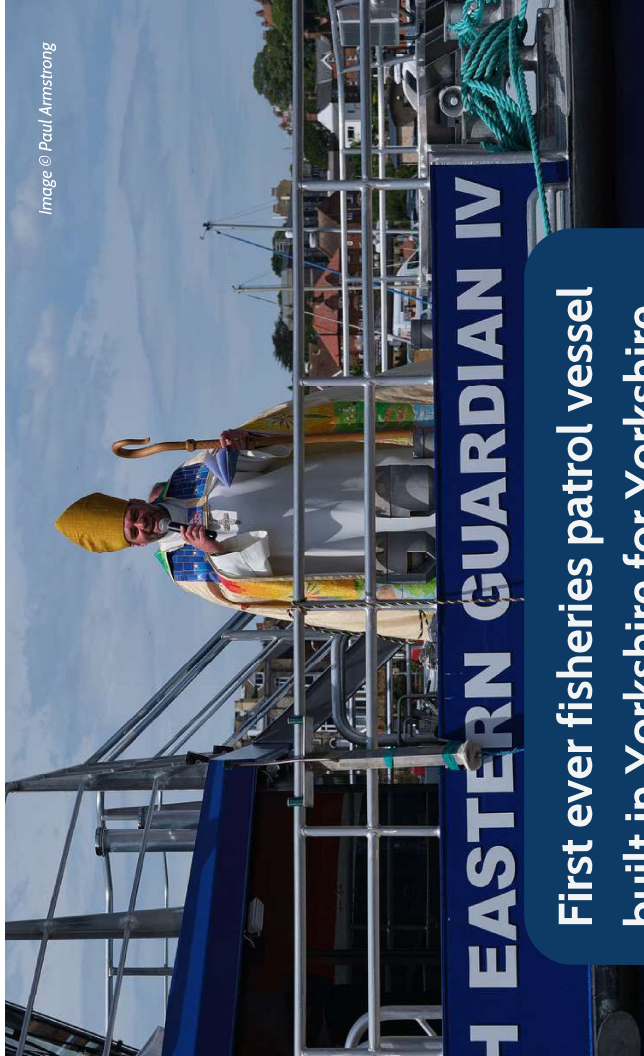

First ever fisheries patrol vessel built in Yorkshire for Yorkshire dedicated by Bishop of Whitby

First ever fisheries patrol vessel built in Yorkshire for Yorkshire, has been dedicated by the Bishop of Whitby, the Rt Revd Barry Hill.

Last Saturday saw the dedication of North Eastern Guardian IV. Built in Whitby by Parkol Marine Engineering, the new vessel will be used by Inshore Fisheries & Conservation Authority to support fishing through marine biology and enforcement across the North East. An all-aluminium first of its kind design, the vessel is the first conceived and built in Yorkshire.

Guests, which included the Head of the Department of Environment, Food, and Rural Affairs (DEFRA) and representatives of some of the nine local authorities served by the vessel, heard from the Chair of Improving Child and Family Arrangements (ICFA) and Professor Emeritus of Marine Biology about the kind of work the vessel will be engaged in before the customary champagne was smashed against it, and Bishop Barry and Area Dean of Whitby, the Revd Michael Gobbett, led a service of naming and dedication.

Bishop Barry reflected on the events recorded in John chapter 21 of the large haul of fish Jesus enabled following his resurrection and what it might mean for us today.

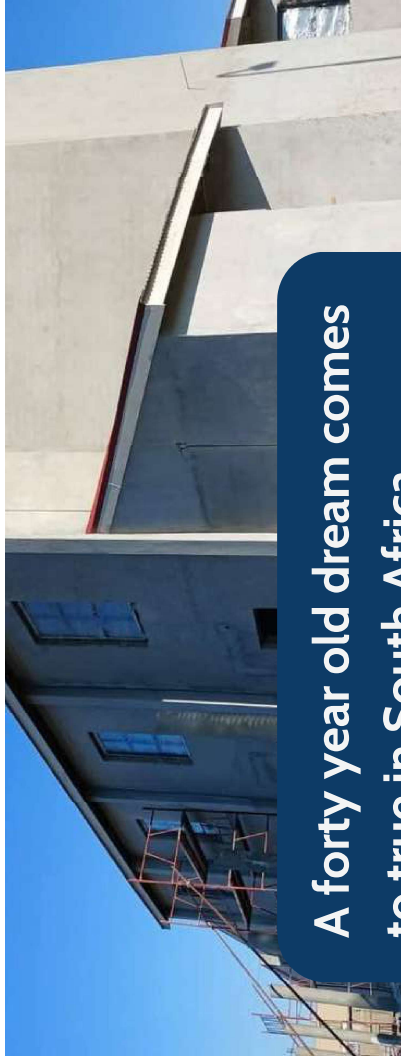

A forty year old dream comes to true in South Africa

The Revd Canon Dr Rachel Mash, Co-ordinator of the Anglican Communion's Environmental Network, shares of a new church in South Africa.

On the 26th of July 2025 Archbishop Thabo and Bishop Joshua Louw will be blessing and dedicating a new church building at Eluvukweni Church in Crossroads. The congregation has a long history of worshipping in difficult circumstances. The congregation was started in the darkest days of apartheid in 1975 by the late Rev David Russell who was the priest at Holy Cross Nyanga. He was passionate about the situation of migrant workers living in Crossroads.

He started a small congregation worshipping in a small home. Eventually they moved into a structure used by a preschool. It was burned down during the violence of 1983 by the "witdoeke".

Rev David Russell was banned and unable to come into Crossroads so he met with members of the congregation. He said it was time for the congregation, which was being led by lay preachers to have a name and they called it "Eluvukweni" – Resurrection – because they believed the church building would rise again.

They built a large shack to worship in, which has been home to this wonderful congregation for many years. The Church has a vibrant ministry with many organisations and an outreach of a soup kitchen serving 100 children 3 times a week.

During winter "we come to church with our prayer books, our hymn books and our mops!". The building has been challenging as South Africa is battling with a wave of 'construction mafia' where there is often extortion when building takes place. Crossroads is in one of the most violent parts of the city and we struggled to get building firms to work in the area, which put the costs up significantly. But God is good and the building is now almost ready to be opened.

The dream is to build a hall and develop the children's soup kitchen into a Montessori Pre-school in this underserved community. We also dream to put solar panels on the church and hall to source ongoing funds by feeding into the grid.

York Churches in Bumper Funding Joy

Eighteen places of worship are celebrating this month after receiving over £95,000 from the Yorkshire Historic Churches Trust (YHCT).

The YHCT is a charity whose objective is to help churches in Yorkshire by offering grants for conservation, repairs and maintenance. Through fundraising, donations and membership, the Trust distributes funding to churches and chapels from all Christian denominations of any age in need of financial assistance to preserve and repair their church. Funding has been awarded to places of worship from Sheffield to Hawes and Bridlington to Birkby and includes Anglican, Catholic, United Reformed Churches as well as a City Church, part of the Christ Central group of churches.

One of the churches receiving funding is St Martin's in Bulmer. The YHCT were delighted to award £9,000 towards repairs to the 14th century tower. This Grade I listed church has great historical significance, housing the head of a Saxon wheel-cross and an effigy of John de Bulmer, who died in the 1270s. His descendant Sir John Bulmer, and his wife, were involved in the Pilgrimage of Grace. The church receives many visitors, and the members of the community are setting up a local history group to create an in-church 'Info point/touchscreen'.

£6,000 was also awarded to All Saints and St James at Nunnington, nestled in the stunning Howardian Hills. Originally dating back to 12th century, this church still houses the altar from 1672 and its original oak door, with mediaeval fleur-de-lys hinges.

The YHCT were delighted to help towards the cost of replacing 4 frosted glass nave windows with clear-glazed square panels with red-coloured borders, to replicate the originals housed in the church before restoration works took place in 1883. The replacement windows will hugely enhance the quality and clarity of light into what is a much loved church, actively looked after by the wider community and open every day to visitors.

The Revd Canon Sue Binks, Vicar at All Saints and St James said: "All Saints and St James Parish Church is cherished by the whole community and holds great meaning for the village; the Church walls are soaked in centuries of prayer and it is such a beautiful place of serenity and beauty to mark the glad and sad happenings of life both individually and corporately".

A Pastoral Letter from The Venerable Dr Amanda Bloor
Archdeacon of Cleveland

September always feels like a pivot point in the year. Summer weather might, if we're lucky, linger on for a while, but September marks the beginning of autumn, with its shorter days, darker evenings and falling leaves. Children return to school after the long break and students get ready to pick up their studies again. Many churches will be celebrating harvest, that celebration of the farming calendar, before the hard work begins of clearing the ground, preparing the soil and getting ready to plant. Farmers know that if you hope for a good harvest next year, you need to start putting the work in now.

Our spiritual lives can benefit from an overhaul at this time of year too. What is it that we need to clear away so that new growth can happen? How can we best feed our souls so that we can really flourish?

Racial Justice Advocates attend Windrush Conference

Yvonne Bowling, Co-Chair of the Diocesan Racial Justice Advocates Group, recently attended a conference organised by the Windrush National Organisation. The conference brought together stakeholders, representatives from the Home Office and faith leaders to look at the Windrush Compensation Scheme. The scheme, which is operated by the Home Office is meant to compensate those whose lives have been impacted by the Windrush Scandal.

Delegates heard how the Home Office's historic immigration policy, where race had been a significant factor, had put many families through years, and in some cases, decades of misery – broken families, shattered careers as well as being denied access to healthcare. Meanwhile those who were wrongly deported or detained say the way they have been mistreated is unforgivable. This has resulted in a deep lack of trust between the affected communities and the Home Office.

Yvonne reflects: "What the Windrush National Organisation is doing is incredible. Maybe they could visit the Diocese of York in the future. It would be an important step forward in our work for them to see what we are doing. At the conference we heard a damning indictment of

past Home Office immigration policy. Many Caribbean migrants have lost faith and fear the UK immigration system.

"It is my impression that there is a major change of heart within the Home Office which they plan to convert into action and rebuild trust in the damaged community, working with partners such as the Diocese of York. I have been liaising with members of the Home Office team and listening to them put in place new plans. I see change coming from the Home Office; they are also looking at ways of speeding up the compensation scheme".

The Racial Justice Advocates Group was set up to following the landmark 2021 report From Lament to Action on tackling racism within the Church of England. A team of Racial Justice Advocates work across the Diocese of York. They have published a Racial Justice Charter and supported the roll out of Racism and Unconscious Bias training for clergy, staff and laity across the diocese.

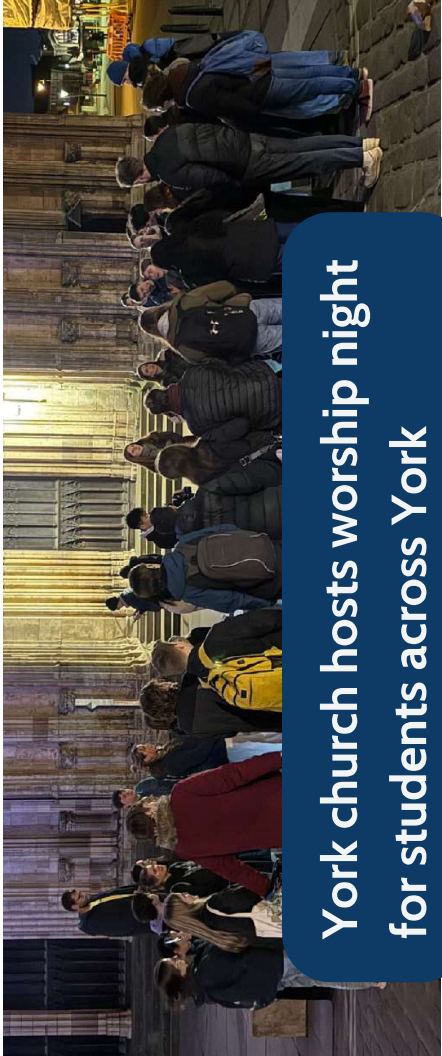

York church hosts worship night for students across York

In February, St Michael-le-Belfrey Church in York partnered with The Send to host a special experience night for students from churches across York.

Joe Portway, Student Worker, reflects:

"The goal was simple: to stir up faith, worship, and mission in our lives and communities. Inspired by the global Send movement, which encourages young people to live fully for Jesus and be sent into every part of society.

"We transformed the venue into a space of worship and encounter. Right from the start, there was a sense of real joy at being gathered together across churches, singing loudly, dancing, waving flags and banners. The worship was full-bodied and full-hearted, creating space for freedom, celebration, and a deep awareness of God's presence.

"After a talk on living boldly for Jesus, we were invited to reflect on where God might be sending us: to our coursemates, to our city, to the nations, or simply to take the next faithful step. One of the most powerful moments came toward the end of the night. After a time of prayer, we were invited to echo Isaiah's words, "Here I am, send me," and commit to going wherever God might lead. Over 50

students stepped forward in response. The atmosphere was full of quiet surrender and deep trust, and many of us shared afterwards how strongly we'd encountered God in that moment.

"But the night didn't end there. As a final step, the majority of students (nearly the whole room) went out into York city centre with the team from The Send to pray for people and share the gospel with those we met. The team told us this level of response was more than they normally see. For many of us, it was our first time doing anything like that, but something shifted. People who had felt timid or unsure found themselves offering prayer, striking up conversations, and discovering that God really can use us, even in simple, surprising ways.

"Since then, it's helped shape how we think about mission in our student community. We're seeing a growing culture of everyday courage: students praying more intentionally, talking more openly about faith, and stepping out with love and boldness in their daily lives. Please pray that the seeds planted that night would keep growing, and that we'd continue to be a community marked by worship, faith, and joyful obedience to Jesus."

Pastoral Letter

A Pastoral Letter from The Rt Rev'd Eleanor Sanderson, Bishop of Hull.

Abide in me as I abide in you. Just as the branch cannot bear fruit by itself unless it abides in the vine, neither can you unless you abide in me. I am the vine, you are the branches. Those who abide in me and I in them bear much fruit, because apart from me you can do nothing. (John 15.4-5).

August is often a time of rest and play. Whether it be the exuberance of school holidays or the quieter pace of some work, this is often a time when people seek to find relaxation and rest more than at other times of the year. Play can be an important type of rest. So, if our home life this month is full of the vibrancy of children and grandchildren, we can embrace this time with a heart of thankful and restful joy, as well as being honest about our corresponding energy levels!

Jesus asks us to abide in him. This is an invitation to rest in him, because he is our source of life. As the branches of a vine only have life and energy because they abide in the vine, so does our source of life come from Christ. God's aliveness means that God's love and power is eternally present to our lives in creating, redeeming and life-giving ways; these are the signs of Christ's fruitfulness in us.

The spiritual pattern of rest helps us to life in greater understanding of God's aliveness to us and with us. For example, the weekly discipline of sabbath reminds us that it is God's world and not our own. Daily and annual patterns of rest are also important. Through choosing to rest we embrace our human limitations in humility and honesty. We give thanks for God's abundance. We learn to seek the fruit of God's life in us.

Rest is one of our core spiritual patterns in our Rhythm of Life. May this month be a time when we all explore how to enter the spiritual grace of rest. May we do so thankfully and creatively and, as a consequence, grow in the love and trust of Jesus, who is our true vine.

Bishop's Boro Big Breakfasts launch

Starting in May 2025, every six months the Bishop of Whitby, who lives in Middlesbrough and serves the town, is hosting a breakfast for 75 community leaders from across different sectors of public life. Based on expressed need, Bishop Barry is using his convening influence to invite leaders for mutual support and encouragement, to share ideas and further develop partnership working. Invitees include those who lead across health, education, civic and political life, the emergency services, local charities, business and faith leaders. The inaugural breakfast was attended by His Majesty's Lord Lieutenant for North Yorkshire and the High Sheriff.

The mornings are hosted at Middlesbrough College, whose catering students cook breakfast. With space for relationship building, each breakfast also includes 'The Big Interview' and 'The Big Question'. The interview gives space to hear from a cross section of invitees about what they do and what they are noticing. At the first breakfast Bishop Barry interviewed the Principal of Middlesbrough College and Deputy Lord Lieutenant, Zoe Lewis, Chair of Trustees of Middlesbrough Football Club Foundation and board member of the South Tees Development Corporation, John Baker, Director of MIMA and Dean of Culture and Creativity at Teesside University, Laura Sillars and Co-Founder & CEO of the Rubies Charity, who support girls to see themselves and each other more positively, Liz Edwards.

This is followed by opportunity to discuss a question for the town. For example, the first breakfast focused on how to foster local voices and agency when it can be easy to default to an external funder. These conversations are supported by a range of people from Middlesbrough Deanery who serve as welcomers and hosts. The morning finishes by acknowledging the catering students and a prayer of blessing for the town.

Bishop Barry said, "There is so much good in our town in which to delight, not least the work and witness of the Christian community, but sometimes we can struggle to find our voice. In a context where nine of the hundred financially poorest parishes in the whole CofE are within Middlesbrough, it is easy for communities to feel overlooked and unseen. My hope is that, in a small way, these occasions can help people know God sees them and that by working together we can do so much more than apart."

This is only one example of the hundreds of coffee mornings, crafts groups, bible study groups, choirs, prayer meetings, and building committees that are the day-to-day of a village church. Each connection brings the opportunity to live the reality of Christ amongst our neighbours who know us and whom we know well. The only big numbers we are likely to see in rural ministry are the heating and insurance bills but our rural churches are an open door for all our local residents to find God right where they live.

From inclusion to belonging

Over one hundred people came to the launch of an exhibition called 'From Inclusion to Belonging' at Hull Minster, organised by Mustard Seed Community Minister Ann Wilkinson.

Ann completed Stepping Up in 2023 and knew that she wanted to use her own lived experience of autism, and her years of experience of working with people with different learning abilities to serve God. Ann's vision was for the church to be a safe, loving and welcoming community where people with different learning abilities and/or neurodiversity can find a place to belong.

Ann reflects: "We often say everyone is welcome in our churches, yet to enable people to feel that they truly belong in a supportive and loving community takes time, commitment and sometimes thinking 'outside the box.' We have seen the people that come into our church as individuals, with their own unique needs, strengths, and gifts and we have put in place things in a way that responds to each person.

"We are all 'fearfully and wonderfully made' (Psalm 139:13-14). We all have a place in church, no matter how we see or feel the world. Sometimes we need to see or feel

church differently, and that's what makes this world the colourful and wonderful place that God made it.

"Over the past year, we have been working with students on placement from Northcott 6th Form College, to give them work experience. It is very difficult for young adults with additional needs to be given these opportunities, and we have proven that with just a few reasonable adjustments they flourish, grow, and mature in a supportive and loving environment. We now have a growing number of people with different learning abilities and/or neurodiversity within the volunteer team.

"In our Thursday Welcome Café, we have made lots of new friends from Active Day Care, CASE and Same Difference. We've set up a Sensory Tent to enable people to go somewhere quieter when they need to be away from the busyness of the cafe. Our friends from Active Day Care entertained us at Christmas with songs from 'The Greatest Showman' and our friends from CASE often visit and entertain us with singing and dancing. They are full of joy and happiness and it's wonderful to see it spreading over everyone who watches them."
