Welcoming New Arrivals

We are pleased to confirm the appointment of the Revd Canon Mark Carey as its new Director of Mission and Ministry, and the Revd Tom Mumford has been appointed Chaplain to support the Bishop of Selby in her role as Lead Bishop for the Diocese of York.

In his role, Mark will build on his long-standing service across the diocese, strengthening our shared commitment to Living Christ's Story. Mark brings decades of parish and leadership experience, shaped by a deep conviction that God forms ordinary disciples for extraordinary faithfulness in everyday life. He will lead and develop the diocese's Mission and Ministry team, working alongside clergy and lay leaders to equip and resource parishes, support local mission, and help communities flourish as confident missionary disciples.

Reflecting on his appointment, Mark said: "I am grateful to be continuing my ministry within the Diocese of York, serving our shared calling to live Christ's story in this generation. Across the parish contexts in which I have served, I have seen how God forms ordinary disciples for extraordinary faithfulness in everyday life. At this time of renewed spiritual openness, I believe the Holy Spirit is inviting us to grow in confidence as missionary disciples."

For Tom, his role of Chaplain will be responsible for providing the Bishop with spiritual, liturgical, administrative, strategic and practical support, and sharing in pastoral oversight. Tom is currently the Vicar of Ipswich Minister and Assistant Area Dean of Ipswich in Suffolk. He also serves the wider diocese as Diocesan Interfaith Advisor, leads on the Suffolk Ministry Development Programme, and is a member of the Bishop's Council and the DBF finance committee.

Tom said: "York was the place I first explored the Christian faith in my early 20s and discovered not only the love of God in Jesus Christ, but also a sense of call to be a priest. It will be a wrench to leave Ipswich and parish ministry where I have enjoyed some extraordinary years, but I feel as if I am being called to return to my spiritual home, both to support the mission and ministry of the diocese, and also of my wife as she explores her own call to be a parish priest. I am excited to see what God has in store for us all in the coming years, and I look forward to meeting the bishops, clergy, staff and people, and serving you all, so that together we may know more fully what it means for us to live Christ's story."

Please pray for Mark and Tom as they begin their new ministries.

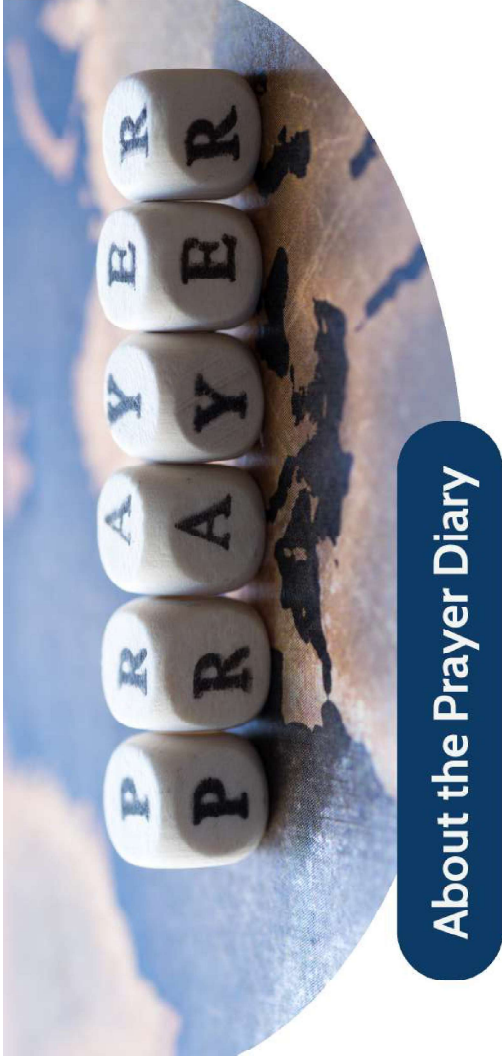

Praying for the Whole People of God

In our Prayer Diary, we pray each day for churches, schools and other communities across our diocese. When we do this, we pray for the whole people of God in that place – all those who lead and serve, those who worship, and those in the wider community.

Diocesan South African Link

The Diocese of York is twinned with three Dioceses in South Africa – Cape Town, False Bay and Saldanha Bay. The Diocese of Saldanha Bay is linked with the Archdeaconry of York, False Bay with the Archdeaconry of Cleveland, and the Diocese of Cape Town with the Archdeaconry of East Riding. The purpose of the link is to encourage one another, in a mutual concern to help each other in our mission to make Christ's love known. We are committing to pray for communities in South Africa each week in our Diocesan Prayer Diary.

Porvoo Communion

The Porvoo Communion is a communion of 15 Anglican and Evangelical Lutheran churches in Europe. The communion was established in 1992 by a theological agreement entitled the Porvoo Common Statement which establishes full communion between and among these churches. The Porvoo Declaration commits the churches which have signed it 'to share a common life' and 'to pray for and with one another'. Welcoming in Easter

"I know Jesus had to die, but why did he have to die like that?" It was a question asked by a faithful soul who had been part of her worshipping community for many years. She understood that Jesus died for our sins, and she was looking for an answer that went beyond, 'Because crucifixion was just how the Romans executed people.'

I think one answer to her question goes something like this: The point of crucifixion was not simply to execute an enemy of Rome, but to publicly humiliate them. The point was that great, powerful Rome wanted to shame its enemies.

And that, of course, was where the story should have ended. Jesus, who claimed that God was so completely with him that they were somehow the same, died in shame. How could God's messiah possibly be shamed in such a way?

At Easter we celebrate God's victory over death. But we also celebrate God's victory over shame. Or perhaps we should say God's absolute identification with those whom society has shamed. With those whom society marginalizes. With those whom powerful voices tell us are 'other.'

But with God, there are no 'others.' Each and every human person is loved and cherished beyond our wildest imaginings. This was one of the things Jesus came to share with God's world. Humans don't seem capable of living any way other than by 'othering' certain groups or certain individuals. By marginalising them. By shaming them. We don't seem able to live in a way which doesn't involve 'us and them.' But Jesus came to invite us into God's kingdom, and God's kingdom isn't like that. In God's kingdom, all are welcome. All are loved and cherished. No-one is shamed.

As we seek to become more like Christ, as we seek to make visible God's kingdom, so it is for us to do the work of Christ: to stand with, to welcome and to cherish each and every human person. This Easter, as we celebrate afresh Christ's resurrection, may we be renewed in our call to be a people who welcome as Christ welcomes and, therefore, as God welcomes.

The Quiet Revival

The Revd David Goodhew reflects on The Quiet Revival

The Revd David Goodhew recently attended a conference hosted by the Church Times, reflecting on recent research from The Bible Society entitled 'The Quiet Revival'.

The Quiet Revival is the title of a Bible Society report. It argues, from opinion polls, that there is an upswing in interest in Christian faith amongst young adults in Britain. The Church Times recently held a day conference on this theme.

So, what is happening? Conference speakers, drawn from across the CofE, spoke of a definite upswing in interest, noticeably from those aged 18 to 30. This is particularly visible in major urban centres, like London and areas of high ethnic diversity. But it can be found across the board. The North Hampshire Downs Benefice is deeply rural. It faces the question of how multiple churches with few stipendiary clergy can grow. But it is managing to do that. The Revd Arwen Folks spoke of how St Mary's Eastbourne is seeing growth within a eucharistic context, and Fr Stephen Langridge saw the same thing within a Roman Catholic context.

Themes that came out included the need to give people 'full-fat' faith, which deep dives into theology, not a 'skimmed' variety; to engage with the digital world; pay great attention to worship – whatever style of worship it is.

Belonging is huge in a world where many are deeply lonely and confused. But belonging by itself is not enough – the gospel will always challenge us to believe.

The Revd Simon Butler, rector of the North Downs benefice said, for me, the most powerful comment; that we should stop obsessing about what we do not have and look at what we do have and see how God might use that. There are struggles aplenty in the church, but the God of Jesus Christ is a God of resurrection.

Celebration Service for Youth Discipleship Ambassadors

Lucy Willshaw, Diocesan GROW Leader, reflects on the recent celebration service at York Minster, where new Youth Discipleship Ambassadors were commissioned by the Bishop of Whitby.

Great is thy faithfulness!

*Morning by morning new mercies I see;
all I have needed thy hand hath provided;
great is thy faithfulness, Lord, unto me!*

So sang a congregation of young people, families, clergy, supporters, and representatives from the diocese in the crypt of York Minster one Saturday morning in January. It was the beginning of a service celebrating the journey that a group of young people had shared over 2025. A journey of growing in faith through exploring the different aspects of the diocesan Rhythm of Life. A journey that has included personal reflection and sharing with others. And what a joyful celebration it was!

The service was put together and led by the young people who had been engaging with GROW, and it culminated with Bishop Barry commissioning them as Youth Discipleship Ambassadors.

When I was invited to lead one of the GROW groups, I knew that it was something that I couldn't refuse! It has been a great opportunity to be part of the wider team and to participate in something beyond my own church setting. It has been a real joy to get to know and travel alongside the young people who have been part of GROW. Preparing and leading the sessions has enabled me to stop and reflect on my own 'Rhythm of Life', and I have learned so much through the young people themselves and those faithful members of their church who have supported us.

I think one of the most important parts of the service was when Bishop Barry asked those present:

"People of God, will you continue to support these young people in their journey of faith, pray for them, and value them as Ambassadors?"

To which we all responded with a hearty, "We will!"

What a responsibility. What a privilege.

Sisters from the OHP Community take part in Vocations Roadshow

Sister Heather-Francis, who is part of the Order of the Holy Paraclete in Whitby, recently took part in a Diocesan Vocations Roadshow, alongside Sister Linda and Sister Helen. Here she shares insights from the day, as well as reflecting on the pattern of the religious life.

"It has always been a tradition for religious houses to welcome guests. This is a way in which we show love for other people and we ourselves are enriched by their presence" (OHP Rule).

Monasteries were the Premier Inns of the Ancient World; sited along the Pilgrim Routes and Trade Routes, they picked and transmitted the news (and often the politics and wealth) of those who passed through them. Eddies of Christianity and its controversies ebbed and flowed with movers and shakers, missionaries, preachers and traders. Many religious communities are finding that their current call is to a renewal of Hospitality: there is a deep need for oases in modern life. So, how does that fit OHP into the Diocese of York?

Pastoral Letter

A Pastoral Letter from The Rt Revd Stephen Race, Bishop of Beverley.

The great, annual, celebration of the Day of Resurrection is behind us once again and we continue through the Easter Season during which we recall the many and glorious Resurrection encounters between Jesus and his followers. During this period we witness initial reactions of fear and bewilderment turn into joy and awe – and the recognition that nothing would ever be the same again.

Two millennia later it is easy for us to live as Christians in the West with a relaxed complacency about it all. We know the stories, we've got the art and music, the traditions and the liturgies. With a bit of effort, we can observe Holy Week and Easter very well.

But do we have within ourselves that heady mix of fear and joy, bewilderment and awe? I suspect that one of the reasons why church attendance and Christian faith declined in this country is that we began to take it all for granted; and once something or someone is taken for granted it is no longer valued and soon becomes neglected.

Writing in the second century, Justin Martyr in his "First apology in defence of the Christians" reminds us that "we hold our common assembly on Sunday because it is the first day of the week, the day on which God put darkness and chaos to flight and created the world, and because on that same day our saviour Jesus rose from the dead." Every Sunday we remember both creation and re-creation when darkness and chaos are put to flight, when sin and death are vanquished. As St John's Gospel teaches us, "What has come into being in him was life, and the life was the light of all people." (John 1.3-4 NRSVA)

The Fourth Sunday of Easter (26th April) is kept as a day of prayer for vocations. Let us pray not only for new ordained and licensed lay vocations to emerge, but also for a renewal in us all of our vocation to proclaim the good news of the Risen Lord. Pray too for the gift of fear and joy, bewilderment and awe for it is the expression of these that will authenticate our witness.

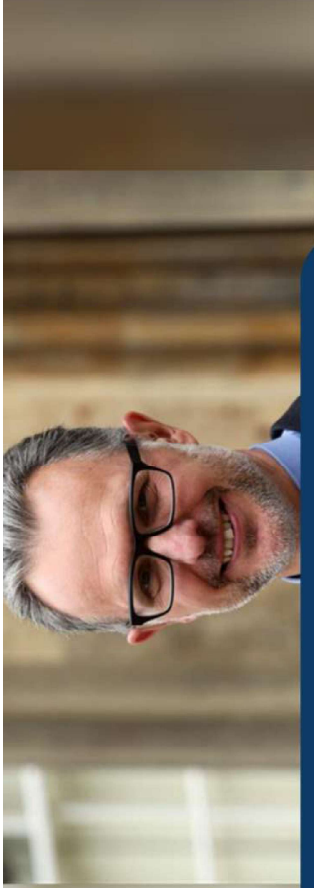

Archdeacon of the East Riding to take up new role in Howden

After nearly 12 years as Archdeacon of the East Riding, the Ven Andy Broom will be moving to a new role this summer.

Andy's next step will begin with an unusual interim arrangement as he is licensed as Assistant Curate to Howden Deanery. He will spend three months working with Permission to Officiate, primarily at St John's, Goole, in the Diocese of Sheffield. At the beginning of Advent, he will then become Rector of Howdenshire Benefice.

Over the past two years, Bishop Eleanor and Andy have been discerning and establishing a partnership between St John's, Goole, the Diocese of Sheffield, the Diocese of York, and Howdenshire Benefice. This partnership will aim to share the recent growth in mission and church vitality at St John's with the Howdenshire churches and sit alongside new SMMIB-funded posts supported by the Diocese of Sheffield.

Following the retirement of the Revd James Little, Rector of Howden Minster and the surrounding parishes, it was expected that someone already known to St John's and the Diocese of Sheffield would be appointed. But as circumstances changed, Andy sensed a

clear and personal call from God to this new ministry and was later interviewed and appointed to the post.

Reflecting on his time as Archdeacon of the East Riding, Andy said: "It has been a great joy and privilege to serve as archdeacon. I have loved the variety of the churches and people across the archdeaconry, and the opportunity to serve the wider diocese. The role of archdeacon is both demanding and stimulating, and I hope, in some small way, I have supported and enabled our churches as they live Christ's Story.

"This opportunity came unexpectedly, and I am excited about what God might do across Howdenshire. I feel very blessed to have this fresh call, and partnering with St John's and the Diocese of Sheffield brings an extra dimension full of possibilities."

There will be an opportunity to say farewell to Andy at a Service of Farewell and Thanksgiving at Beverley Minster on 30 June at 7.30pm. Booking details will follow soon. All are welcome.

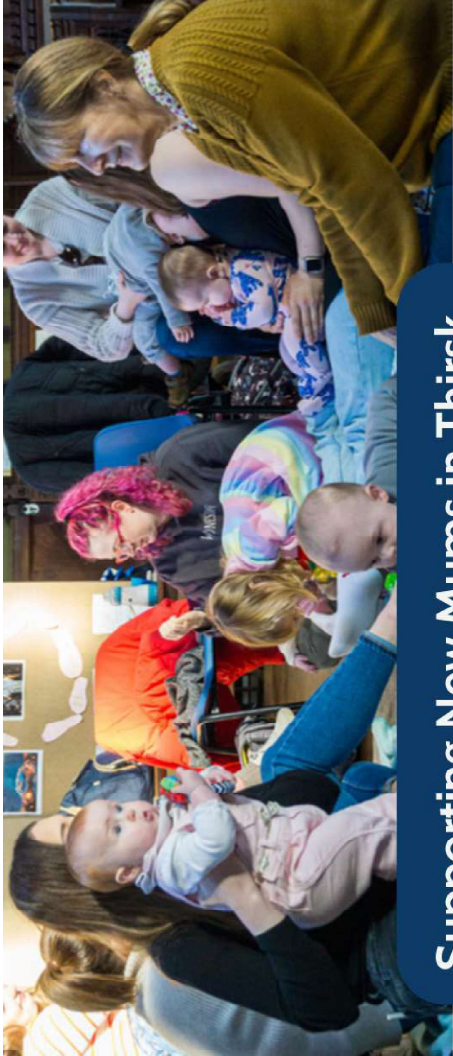

Supporting New Mums in Thirsk

The first weeks and months with a new baby can bring both joy and challenge. When midwife Tracey noticed that postnatal provision had changed after the pandemic, she and the community at St Mary's, Thirsk, saw an opportunity to offer local mums a place of welcome, support, and friendship.

Initiated as part of the Diocese of York's Multiply project, which helps develop new worshipping communities among people in their 20s, 30s and 40s, Nurture supports new and expectant mums from the end of pregnancy until their babies are around a year old.

Tracy said: "We started thinking about this group about four years ago because, as a midwife in Thirsk, I noticed we hadn't got the baby groups that were for newborn babies, the health visitor role had changed, and we just needed something for the mums to make friends, so coffee, chat, and to bring their babies and get to know each other."

The group was started by St Mary's Church and is run in partnership with other churches in the market town. This shared approach helps keep Nurture free for all families in need. Families stay in touch through Facebook and WhatsApp, where mums share questions, encouragement and practical help. The relationships formed through Nurture have continued beyond the group itself,

with families connecting with wider church life and activities.

The Revd Mary Roils, Rector of Thirsk Parishes and Area Dean for Mowbray, said: "It acts as quite a community space as mums post concerns or queries into the hive mind, and share stuff that babies have grown out of or when Aldi or Lidl have baby offers. It also gives us a quick means of inviting to Christingle, Mothering Sunday services, Easter trails and anything that's going on in the churches.

"The connection with the churches is great. One of the churches started a Thursday morning tots group, recognising that this was an area and time they could serve. We have baptised lots of the babies, confirmed one of the mums, and married two sets of parents. It is such a win for us in creating a really natural relationship that continues as the children grow."

Nurture shows how Living Christ's Story takes shape through practical, compassionate care for new mums and families. In giving mums "some more adult company", churches in Thirsk are building trusted relationships and offering a warm welcome at an important but vulnerable time in families' lives.

They not only changed the world around them but can still challenge, inspire, and encourage us today.'

This summer, the Church of England offers a new reflection campaign centred around pilgrimage – places and stories that help us feel part of something bigger on our journey towards God.

The new resource, 'Pilgrim Places, Holy Lives: A Gospel Journey with the Early English Saints', help us to see the saints not merely as remarkable people from the past but as fellow travellers on the pilgrim journey who can shape our identity, our worship, and our witness to the world today. Among the reflections include stories from saints who walked the paths of our own diocese - Cedd, Alcuin, and Hild - and contributions from Archbishop Stephen, Professor Dee Dyas OBE, and our diocesan Discipleship Adviser, Sammi Tooze.

Running from the day after Pentecost (25 May) to 21 June, these readings and reflections explore eight places which were important in the spread of Christianity in England, and the stories of the saints who lived there. Each day will include a Bible reading, a prayer, a short reflection and a suggested action or reflective question.

Sammi Tooze, Diocesan Discipleship Adviser, comments, "It's been an honour to be part of this project, sharing the stories of holy people gone before us. As the Church of England focusses on pilgrimage these few months and beyond, this is a great opportunity for churches and individuals to reflect on our own spiritual journeying, and intentional everyday faith."

The Everyday Faith app will carry reflections for adults every Monday to Saturday, based on the booklet. The reflections will be shared from 25 May to 20 June and available for a further 90 days after publication for those who want to begin the journey at another date. These aim to complement existing resources, including the new 'Pilgrim Places' resources released as part of the Faith in the North initiative, which includes signage, 'Being a Pilgrim' Prayer Cards, illustrated reflective trails, and a set of 'Pilgrim Explorer Cards' – a new resource for children and young people to explore the building and its stories.

Philip Moore embarks on Benefice Organ Crawl

Philip Moore, former Director of Music at York Minster, who now worships in The Street Parishes Benefice in the Diocese of York, shares his experience of playing for the annual Organ Crawl across the local villages.

I began my organ playing career when I was a child in the parish of St Mary and All Saints, Boxley in Kent. The church is set, magically, in the foothills of the North Downs. There are several daughter churches and it was in those that I first played for services. My life has taken me through a variety of posts since then, finishing in York Minster. On retirement in 2008 I moved to Barton le Street and became, once again, a village organist. In a wonderful way I feel my life has come full circle, living in a village not far from the North York Moors. There are three fine organs in our Benefice, all in good order and shortly after moving here I had the idea that I should give a recital, in the summer at three of our churches, Hovingham, Slingsby and Barton le Street. As we might crawl from pub to pub I referred to the evening as an organ crawl, a name that has stuck.

Many of our village churches in the British Isles have very fine organs. They may not be large and able to shake the rafters of the churches, but they have, nevertheless, unique characters of their own, often with sounds that are intrinsically beautiful. I felt that to highlight our instruments

one evening in the summer would be a good way of alerting people to the treasures that are contained in our churches.

We began the organ crawl in the summer of 2009 and apart from a break during lockdown, have continued ever since. I play for about twenty minutes in each church, beginning in Hovingham and moving via Slingsby to Barton le Street. We finish the evening with refreshments in Barton le Street Village Hall. Churches are wonderful places for concerts and I like to think that those who do not attend church on a regular basis are sometimes attracted to come to church in order to hear music. Architecture and music have a magic all of their own, reminding us that "craftsman's art and music's measure for thy pleasure all combine."

The care of our organs is vital and money spent on their upkeep is money well spent. We therefore ask for donations in each church that go towards the maintenance of these lovely organs. The 2026 organ crawl is on 26th June. We allow twenty minutes for travel between each recital so the timings are: Hovingham 6.20 pm; Slingsby 7.00 pm; Barton le Street 7.40 pm; refreshments start at 8.00 pm. We look forward to seeing you!



Unpacking Rural Ministry

The Revd David Messer, who alongside being Area Dean of North Holderness, is also Priest in Charge of the Benefice of Sigglesthorne with Nunkeeling and Bewholme, held in plurality with the Benefice of Skirlaugh, Catwick, Long Riston, Rise, Swine with Ellerby. In these places of village life, David shares some of his experiences of rural ministry.

Many years ago I was asked by a Rural Dean, from a small sized town, "What did we do in Rural Ministry? It seems like a doddle. It must be all garden fetes and landed gentry." I am afraid that this attitude to Rural Ministry is not a stand-alone thought. Many people see Urban Ministry as cutting edge and where things happen.

Rural Ministry is so much more in my opinion. I serve a Rural Benefice of eight churches and communities in North Holderness with three Primary Church school where I am a Governor, and I love it. Each church and community is different in its identity and has its own behaviour and personality. We face the issues that are faced by most communities, whether rural or urban. There is a lack of social and affordable housing in particular for those starting out, and Country Lines - the distribution of drugs, and addiction of a variety of substances - is not uncommon. Transport

links are poor, hindering access to facilities which are located in the large towns, and homelessness and rough sleeping are often hidden issues.

So what do we do? We try to help in those circumstances by providing places for people to meet. These are provided a raft of volunteers who give their time up to help, places to share their stories. We try to ensure people are supported pastorally or given access to the support they need via professionals. In some cases we have spoken to our Councils about the lack of social housing. Also we try to support our farming communities in their daily lives and walk alongside them when issues become too much.

We also provide our weekly services, our bible studies, our prayer groups, our cafes and our churches as places of welcome and warmth. Services of Baptism and Marriage and a place to grieve for those we have lost. But the main thing in Rural Ministry is the people and the beauty of creation that sits around us in the countryside.

So its not just garden fetes and landed gentry. There is so much more to Rural Ministry once we look beyond these old fashioned stereotypes.

Where hardship means hunger... urban farmers can grow hope

Christian Aid supporters will be fundraising this Christian Aid Week (10-16 May).

With seven days to make a difference, every gift, act and prayer counts. You can still be part of Christian Aid Week, for example, holding a retiring collection, encouraging on-line donations or attending a Deanery event. Everything you do will support someone like Fridah Moraa, pictured here, to grow food for her children and nurture hope.

In Nairobi, most parents wake knowing they must earn money, otherwise their children won't eat that evening. Without formal work, low pay, and no social support, it's a daily struggle. 'When I wake up, I have a lot of worries. Sometimes I don't have food,' says Fridah, a widowed grandmother determined to support her family on what little she earns. 'Now I'm responsible for everything.' With school, rent and water costs, providing food is an unending problem.

But Fridah's faith, and in her abilities, is unwavering. With tools, seeds and training from Christian Aid's partner, Beacon of Hope, Fridah's now making the most of a small city space to

grow fresh vegetables to cook for her family or sell at market. Fridah says: 'I never thought that a woman could also be a provider.' With her inner strength, unstoppable resolve, and help from Beacon of Hope, Fridah's overcoming poverty to protect her family from malnutrition. Fridah takes pride in her achievements: 'When I harvest what I've planted, it makes me happy. Urban farming has changed my life.'

£5 buys seeds for a vegetable garden
£10 buys two chickens to produce fertiliser
£15 purchases gardening tools
£30 buys planters that host hundreds of plants in a tiny space

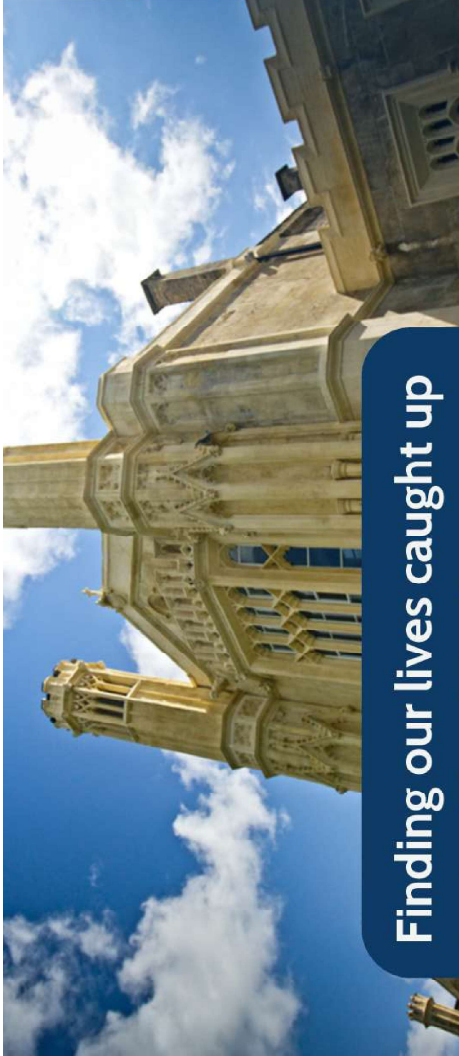

Finding our lives caught up in the life of God

The Revd Daniel Jones, Chaplain at St Peter's School, reflects on aspects of his ministry and the role that chaplaincy plays within communities.

As Chaplain to the staff and pupils at St Peter's School, I consider it an enormous privilege that our community gets the chance to gather in Chapel five times a week.

The Chapel is a space where, for many of our pupils, whether they consider themselves religious or not, the life of the community can be most tangibly felt. When former pupils come back to the School, it's almost always the place that they're most keen to visit. I rarely tire of reminding them that the Chapel is a space where we can give thanks for what's best about who we are, both as individuals and collectively. It's here, as we share stories, that we find our lives caught up in the life of God.

As I walk into Chapel each day, I always pause briefly to look at the cross which hangs above the altar. The Chapel cross was designed and created by John Brown, who taught at the school for almost forty years. It was dedicated

by the Dean of York and hung in Chapel on St Peter's Day in 1977 as part of the School's 1350th birthday celebrations. Over my fifteen years as Chaplain, I have come to love it. It's a constant reminder that the story of God's love, reaching out into our community, has been told in this place since before any of the current community arrived. Each of us is part of a story that extends beyond our own arrival. And the spiral pattern upon which it is based seems to radiate from the single red piece at the centre. Do our lives and the world in all its beauty and grandeur, I wonder, spiral out of the breaking heart of God?

Next year, the School will celebrate its 1400th birthday. We will go into that year praying that we may remember that we are part of God's story, unfolding in this place. May you too feel yourself part of God's story, poured out for the world and drawing all things into abundant life.

Pastoral Letter

A Pastoral Letter from The Venerable Andy Broom, Archdeacon of the East Riding.

A Big Adventure

'What are you going to do when you grow up?' I guess we've all been asked that at some point. I seem to recall saying 'I don't know but I want to work with people and not always be stuck at a desk' ... looking back it's turned out ok!

Whether it's those 'big' life choices, or the smaller everyday ones, we often find ourselves having to make decisions. Sometimes it's very easy, sometimes it's not. And what about adding God into the mix? Does it help to ponder such questions through the lens of 'What does God want of me?' or 'What are God's plans and purposes in this situation?'

I like the analogy of the life of faith being like living out an adventure. In the best adventures there are always twists and turns, high points and low, and the unexpected happens. Often that describes our lives with God. If we see our lives as an adventure with God, then it is pleasing him and remaining within his plans and purposes that matters most. All of this means the questions we might wrestle with are not simply 'how do I decide on this, or that?' but also 'how best can I be living my life with God, what does he want of me?'

Working out exactly how we do this isn't always straight forward, but we can choose to set our hearts on seeking to live this way. Proverbs 3.5-6 helps me - it encourages us to 'Trust in the Lord with all your heart, lean not on your own understandings, in all your ways acknowledge him, and he will make your paths straight'. Maybe if we can establish this outlook, then the individual decisions may become easier.
